 - a. Kathleen Mabley, Director of Brand Initiatives
 - i. My job is to help build our brand, work with staff, faculty, communicators, working for you and the university
 - ii. When you think about a brand, what do people think about when they hear UT? Football? Athletics? Research? Seal, longhorn
 - iii. Just because there is a lot of buzz about us, it doesn't mean there is a lot of support for us, we need to raise money from private donors. Our vision is to be the best public research institution in the nation. That helps strengthen our brand. We are striving for a successful culture at all levels. Is it a name, logo, tagline, market niche, sales channel, location, customer experiences, fragile asset, communications style?
 - iv. It is not created or delivered by any one person, it is happening everywhere. Marketers build brands, and sure, gardeners build plants. The total experience builds our brand. You want that consistency, when you hear it you want consistent thoughts
 - v. Our brand is our voice, identity, constituents experience, and how people understand who we are and what we do everyday. In 2010-2011 a brand research and strategy project, my branch was created, all to take UT's brand to the next level, secure funding, engage alumni, elevate leadership reputation, foster relationships with corporations, attract the best and brightest students and faculty. We want to present one voice and one university to the outside world
 - vi. In the research we have realized there is huge pride. We are perceived as an enduring leader, academic strength, valuable educational experience; we have a targeted audience mindset, game changers.
 - vii. Long and involved positioning statement, a global community united for a new vision of leadership in higher education for the next generation of leaders, SEE slide show.
 - viii. The tone of our communications is that personality, we are bold, innovative unique. If you have an experience from one touch point to another should be inspiring.
 - ix. Brand pillars - engaging a common purpose, focusing on creativity and critical thinking, making the greatest impact, these are informing our stories.
 - x. Personality is bold and passionate
 - xi. Stories we tell support our brand pillars, print and marketing material should represent that same voice, 15 second spots, till last week I was not allowed to air due to music copyright
 - xii. We want to make sure there are guidelines that everyone is following, we know there are issues with trademarks and licensing, I have a 3 hour meeting

with them to walk through that, we recently rolled out a new word mark, the old one didn't show up great

- xiii. Experience is a big part of what our brand imaging is, when you think about our experience it could be online (registrars website, department website, another office) seems like different companies, in the classroom, extracurricular, and the experience should reflect the brand pillars, when communicators and staff are interacting with people they should reflect the brand pillars, living the pillars and making an impact, focusing on creative thinking and innovation, building the brand, shaping the understanding of the brand for external and internal constituents.

- i. Thanks for being here. We have one more meeting next Tuesday, we have business that will be coming back, we want things to be coming to a vote, we will be having a get together with the new reps and I hope any of you who are interested to come help out. We have representative of the year and legislation of the year, you have until the end of next meeting
- ii. John Lawler: Parking benefit district meeting was supposed to be this week, it was postponed until april 12th from 7-9pm in Burdine 212, SG has voted against this in the past, at that meeting a simple majority of the attendees will vote on that. Affordable housing issue is still being debated, trying to decentivizing building in west campus, trying to make it in such a manner where people will not build, we have been recommending incentivizing affordable building, they are being fickle now by tacking on regulatory fees, if you are interested at all, ask me if you are interested
- iii. Single member districts - heard over spring break, politics is getting the best of that and there is a minority group who lost the vote and dont want this system so they are trying to undermine that, there was a press conference, I went to that
- iv. Bekah Thayer - On a lighter note, the fall break initiative that we passed earlier this semester, Kori and I met with the chair of the faculty council committee chair and she is on our side, she has done her research on the positive effects, initially we thought a lot of the problems were deciding where it will fall, the main issue at hand is that there are 75 days in the spring and only 70 in the fall, as of now the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board has set a starting date, UT has always abided by that, but there is no problem with moving our starting date forward, we just have to look at the costs associated and the opinion of faculty and staff. Kori: On the calendar committee there are a couple of members against this, we need to make sure we come at it with a productivity argument

XIV. New Business

a. AB 5 – Invest in Texas Constitution

i. Rules that iit have been operating under for the past two years, trying to codify it, that is the intent, the wording details are the way it currently operates, we expanded on it a little bit

ii. Lawler: I have several questions, in Article III, duties and rights of the co-directors, can you go in depth about the autonomy?

iii. Desai: Once each director is appointed by each of the LSOs, they have their own autonomy outside of the LSOs,

iv. Lawler: So it is creating a separate entity, which is linked, but not part of the others

v. Desai: It is just Codifying what was already in place

vi. Lawler: Right now, if Iit wants to lobby for something, it has to be unanimous between the three groups?

vii. Desai: Yes, SG can lobby on its own behalf, but it has to be supported by all three bodies

viii. Lawler: So this would have some overlap, since Senate deals with academic issues, it would be stating its opinion on other issues

ix. Desai: Senate would just have to agree on reviewing it without having to pass anything

x. Thompson: would you consider Iit a program or an organization

xi. Desai: I say its kind of both, it started off as a program and and initiative, and now its more of an organizations

- xii. Thompson: Kind of an agency?
 - xiii. Desai: I wouldnt say an agency because that means its part of our executive body
 - xiv. Thompson: My concern is that it would separate from the LSOs and be its own thing
 - xv. Desai: Thats why we have the checks of the directors being in charge of the directors, being able to remove them and appoint them
 - xvi. Lawler: I share a lot of these concerns, but you brought up a good issue that I wanted to ask you about, who is going to have the power to appoint/remove. After an appointment, who is going to remove that person?
 - xvii. Desai: Right now it would be just like our current system, we can add in stipulations for impeachment
 - xviii. Townsell: Has there been a discussion or are you open to discussion to coordinating the position of director on the SG end being under Civic Engagement?
 - xix. Desai: the reason that we left it the way it is is to leave flexibility, if the exec wants a certain person to do it, they can, not tied to a specific portfolio
 - xx. Lawler: Senate is passing this this thursday, is there a way we can communicate our concerns?
 - xxi. Butler: I can verbalize them to Senate when I give my report if you send them to me
 - xxii. Thompson: what happens if a co-director for SG is not appointed, does that mean IIT operates without an SG stake?
 - xxiii. Desai: They are appointed by the president
 - xxiv. Thompson: We have had problems with appointments, would that jeopardize our stake?
 - xxv. Desai: As long as there is a president, they can appoint
 - xxvi. Lawler: It says they can review legislation to set the platform, does that give them to freedom to set their own platform?
 - xxvii. Desai: They can review, they dont set the platform
 - xxviii. Lawler: Can they set the tone of the legislation that is passed/reviewed?
 - xxix. Desai: They can decide which bills to discuss with senators/representatives
 - xxx. Hicks: Is this an amendment of SG's rules, or are we just approving this as a body?
 - xxxi. Desai: We can discuss that, I introduced it as an amendment to the bylaws because I think it is a part of the Student Government
 - xxxii. Lawler: If this is an AB, do we need the exact locations in the rules to codify this
 - xxxiii. Hicks: IT would have to happen in Internal Affairs
 - xxxiv. Desai: Would it have to be that or would it be its own document
 - xxxv. Hicks: It could but it would have to be discussed as far as where it lies in terms of superiority to other documents
- b. AR 36 – In Support of Creating a Fluoride Free Fountain at the University of Texas at Austin
- i. Debate over fast-track meaning

ii. Video watched

iii. We are concerned about students on campus who are vulnerable to the affects of fluoridated water, student with thyroid problems, diabetes, other conditions

Rosenthal: two questions: Is it the fluoride that is causing the kidney problems, or are the kidney problems getting worse because of the fluoride?

Love: I cant answer that

Dr. Norris: You are at a lot of risk for a lot of reason, you are at risk for cancer, kidney, thyroid problems, decreased intelligence, but you cant say causes

Desai: I am on the AMA website and it says that the AMA endorses fluoridation in community water supplies

Dr. Norris: A whole bunch of them do, but thats all they can do is point at the list of the people that still do, the American Dental Association came out with a study two summers ago that says it doesnt help with studies

Dr. Presley: there are individual doctors that do not support fluoridation, imagine a little child and a 6 foot man who get the same supply of this medication, that doesnt make sense, this should not be a one size fits all chemical, regardless of what the website says, would a doctor supply a progressive dosage of medicine

Desai: But they do do it now

Dr. Presley: What you read about on the website I want you to put through your brain, would doctors prescribe a one-size fits all supplement of this medication

Fassio: The first question I have is that I understand that so far through the literature through the CDC and the NRC and fluorosis, specifically with children who are at increased risks, it seems like none of these entities have come up with a concise explanation of these issue with kidney disease, thyroid disease and diabetes, why is there not a definitive answer?

Dr. Presley: The lack of knowledge about the target concentration of fluoride required in the oral environment to optimize its potential for caries prevention has inspired the NIDCR to issue a call for research- they are asking the same thing, there are no answers

Fassio: It doesnt seem like there is a straight answer if fluoride causes or exacerbated different diseases or conditions

Dr. Presley: There is a Harvard study on bone cancer in boys, thyroid cancer, we aren't here to present that research. the key is the ADA does not know how much to put in the water and there are individuals who are sensitive to the chemical

Rosenthal: This legislation the wording is for the University of Texas at Austin, is there specific research at this university for these students who have these specific problems?

Dr. Presley: I dont know that there is any of that research, but the bottom line question is that the dosage in the water and the one size fits all model is not appropriate for all students

Dr. Norris: I suggest to you that even in a lot of these earlier studies, we are not very sensitive to the results of tests to who is contributing to the medical journals (drugs). I challenge you to find any current study that shows that fluoride is beneficial to any community, the studies where short-term, cancer you have to look over 15,20,30 years, many of the early studies are badly flawed, there are many studies that look at other elements that arent being used today, it is difficult when you have a complex mixture of several substances that are toxic and should not be put in the water, they are runoff from fertilizers, there are too many variables in many of the studies, Dr. Carman worked for the Texas Commission on Environmental Studies, it is a chemical waste that is sold to cities for water fluoridation, it is a byproduct of the phosphate

fertilizer, you can get the MSDA from the city of Austin that lists it as a hazardous waste, its only allowed to be in the water because it is diluted, but it is a very toxic waste product. The MSDS sheet is warning about this chemical, it is hurtful to babies' bones and teeth. Bone and joint pain and limited range of motion. Every person is dependent on its own situation. This is the concern for UT students, do we have a case where some people are okay with it and some people arent from a health stand point?

Desai: You talked about a one dose fits all, but would you not say that all chemicals are okay in a one size fits all?

Dr. Presley: Chlorine for antibiotics, would you be okay with lithium for suicidal people? It keeps the water clean. You cant get this chemical as a prescription

Dr. Norris: Its a toxic waste, it would be illegal to leave it on the ground, put it in a waste dump, put it in the sky

Desai: where does overexposure apply, is there a certain healthy level?

Dr. Presley: Mother's milk has no fluoride in it, woman's body filters it, there is no recommended daily allowance

Desai: Is there a healthy point? Overexposure point?

Dr. Presley: We dont know the answer to that, we have put it in the water at .7ppm, ADA said that we dont know what amount is healthy, this book has scores that show how detrimental it is

Dr. Norris: The supreme court in the European union has disallowed it

Walker: This is one of those things like hydrogenated oils

Dr. Carman: We have a lot of issues with not removing things we have deemed to be hazardous, this book is by three scientists who studied this issue with years, says that fluoride is a hazardous chemical, we dont do a good job in the united states of regulating toxic things, smoking, asbestos, leaded gasoline, they dont change those things right away because there are millions of dollars in those industries. Aspartame is a toxic sugar sweetener. Just like triclosan you will find that we have several ways to go.

Love: These are awesome questions, I would like to remind you that this legislation is about protecting vulnerable populations to fluoridation.

Lawler: There is only one be it resolved that deals with this issue, the fluoride be it resolved, what i am saying that there are no proven studies for benefits of fluoride, but there are studies that prove it is detrimental

Dr. Norris: Males are susceptible to osteosarcoma

Fassio: How were they able to prove that this chemical exacerbated these conditions, specifically kidney disease, diabetes, thyroid disease

Love: Fluoridation filtration issues with the kidney

Dr. Carman: Kidney doctors are worried about fluoride issues with kidneys because it cannot be fully removed even at low concentrations and it is highly toxic

Dr. Presley: They take populations for example say children in places like China and compare those populations to people with water fluoridations

Fassio: So they go to specific communities and find people with kidney problems and give people who do fluoride

Dr. Presley: They do not give it to them, they are ingesting it

Fassio: But are they targeting people with these problems

Dr. Presley: Random groups

Thompson: In the midst of the debt crisis at the university, do you know what kind of effect this will have

Love: 5,000 dollars for 5 reverse osmosis filters

Thompson: Your legislation is only asking for 5?

Love: Yes, providing a fluoride free option with reverse osmosis water

Goodson: For people who live in residence halls, is that water fluoridated

Love: Yes, all of austin

Goodson: Brita filters?

Love: Only chlorine

Goodson: For those of us who dont want our bones to harden but dont mind having stains on our teeth, how do we fix that?

Dr. Presley: Fluoridated toothpaste. Would you swallow your sunscreen?

Desai: NHMRC has said that fluoride is unlikely to represent any real medical affect on the public

Dr. Presley: I would ask them if one-size fits all medicine is a model of acceptable dosage. It doesnt matter what a government entity tells us, you have to think about it logically

Desai: What would you say in response to them approving this?

Dr. Presley: I would say that a one-size fits all model does not work, the doctor would not prescribe an antibiotic dosage for both a child and a grown man

Dr. Carman: You really need to look at primary sources and studies, not press releases or

Lawler: How much special projects funds money do we have left?

Ilse: Depending on ad amounts 2-3 thousand.

Lawler: So we could put up half, would you suppose that there are organizations on campus that can put up the other half through fundraising

Love: Science may not agree, but there are people that are sensitive to this chemical, and they should be able to make that choice

De La Cruz: would you mind reading the book title

Dr. Carman: National resource council, fluoride in drinking water, a scientific review of fluoridated drinking water, harvard osteosarcoma study was published one month after so it wasnt reviewed, done by four harvard professors who did an epidemiological study on young boys and linked it to

Desai: I am looking at the CDC website and they actually recommend .7ppm

Love: A year ago they recommended .7ppm-1.2ppm and changed it across all environmental standards after that study

Rosenthal: You talked about not to look at the press releases and to look at the primary sources, this needs to be fixed to represent what you are trying to tell us

Love: I would love if you joined us

Schipper: If we can put a lot of research in here that makes fluoride look bad, how far do we want to go, we can make it a really bad substance, you can make it really extreme

Rosenthal: The intent is really unclear, can you make it real clear

Love: It is to provide students with an option between fluoridated and unfluoridated water and to educate people about the issue. If there is another intention that is coming out

Desai: Move to extend by one minute

Desai: You talked about the warning signs, there seems to be a lot of debate on the issue of health problems or not, what would you like them to say?

Love: That is a great questions, I would like you to help us write them, we dont want it to say dont drink the water, we dont want to scare everyone, just inform them

- c. AB 6 – Addition of the Assembly Board
 - Carlson* i. MAtt has done a really good job at formalizing the new structure, the assembly has a lot of power, we need to show the other branches that we have a formalized structure, this is kind of bear bones, I have been meaning to write this for about six months now, it will help our assembly be stronger by having its assembly
 - ii. Butler: Will the president still be making the *appointments?*
 - iii. Carlson: Thats the one big change I think is substantive, I think the assembly should appoint its own vacancies
 - iv. Butler: I think in a lot of other representative bodies the executive appoints those vacancies, like in state bodies
 - v. Carlson: What we generally do is have appointments or recommendations from councils, you cant do that with university-wide positions
 - vi. Desai: This leaves college reps up to councils?
 - vii. Carlson: Yes
 - viii. Desai: what happens if there is some sort of a tie?
 - ix. Carlson: That is a good questions, we can write something in for that, there are still some holes that needed to be filled
 - x. Lawler: Why does this say that absence policy be taken out of internal affairs?
 - xi. Carlson: Internal affairs reps are the same level reps of all reps, why should they have that power, it should be done at the leader level rather than the representative level
 - xii. Thompson: Which of the bylaws need to be changed?
 - xiii. Carlson: It would add to the bylaws, take out absence policy, appointment process
 - xiv. Committed to Internal Affairs
 - xv. AR 37, UT students for Modern Warriors came to talk about a new statue
