



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

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

 - iii. Calve: I said what I wanted to say last week, important, will allow a more advantageous election situation for students
 - iv. Rady: Motion to approve by unanimous consent

- e. AR 39 – In Support of the Participation of Center Directors in Promotion and Tenure Committee Discussions
- i. Milligan: Academic Affairs met and we passed this by unanimous consent
 - ii. Houston: 1 note during AA, 4th from last whereas where it says "resources include", it says its important to ensure that the best instructor that teaches these materials, as



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- iii. Redding: When you say the promotion and tenure committee, are you talking final level? There are four levels. First or last level? Home department doesn't give them a favorable recommendation then it doesn't matter
- iv. Davis: We mean for the entire decision process, its all inclusive,
 - v. Vincent: Whats the reason behind your question, are there things we need to consider?
 - vi. Redding: Graduate studies, within the college, dean of college, dean of graduate studies, if they aren't getting high enough at the level, if they are at a higher level it doesn't help them at the lower level, the centers don't have faculty, affiliate faculty, don't see where the director coming in can make a meaningful process unless its at the the lowest level. Misunderstanding on my part at what this is trying to accomplish, I can withdraw the whole line of questioning. It might be easier.
 - vii. Vincent: To answer your questins, there are questions related to this that aren't in line with the text, we can bring those up.
 - viii. Gold: The two ladies that came to talk with us, did you wourk with them to craft this legislation?
 - ix. Zhao: Yes
 - x. Approved by hand vote
- f. AB 17 – Edits to the Internal Rules and Procedure
 - i. Riou: The rules and regulations committee met on this on Thursday night at 6 in the SG office, made quite a few amendments, still solid, passed with unanimous consent.
 - ii. Gold: Will you just tell us what has changed?
 - iii. Metoyer: Before the rules and regulations committee meeting a lot of the changes were focused on agencies and executive branch, committee changes were legislative and grammatical.
 - iv. Metoyer: Appointment section: We had some concerns this year about our appointment process (not very spelled out) not defined, whose job it is to make them public, what the process was for appointments
 - v. Williams: Are you also saying that appointments should be posted online prior to that? 7 days prior if any changes?
 - vi. Metoyer: If someone is taken off of their assignment they need to be taken off of the website (7 days to remove)
 - vii. Gold: In the post vote legislative process, it says exactly who would get a piece of the legislation, what would happen when there are others? Still administrative director?


- a. AR 40 – In Support of Senate Bill 15 – Heard before executive reports
 - i. Redding: I said I would be talking about it later, didn't realize later would be so soon, very similar to the one passed in GSA, very similar with the words Student Government over GSA, we've gone over this a lot. It is pretty straight forward, endorses senate bill 15, hearing is tomorrow
 - ii. Love: Is this in support of Bill Powers?
 - iii. Redding: Its ambivalent, any president, really about contraining the role of the Board of Regents
 - iv. Vincent: Are there specific areas that the regents encroach that we are concerned about
 - v. Redding: The biggest concern that I have, and I have been a student for 7 years, is what is really trying to get out is to try to stop the micromanagement of the university. There is a system and a university and a president and a large administration, and have regents micromanage down to dean and department chairs is what caused GSA to support this, constraining the regents and what they do.
 - vi. Wilson: Move to suspend the rules and fast-track this legislation, seconded
 - vii. Vote: Approved
 - viii. Redding: I don't think its changed much, I could be wrong
 - ix. Vincent: Do you think that this resolution in conjunction with GSA passing that will give a lot of momentum for this senate bill?
 - x. Redding: I think so, a united front will help this bill, a lot of late breaking stuff, law school investigation, the letter that the senate is sending to the regents, shows that students are paying attention and do care about what is happening.
 - xi. Gold: Are any of the other students governments in our system doing something similar?



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- xii. Redding: Not that I know of, a lot of medical schools have voiced similar concerns, but haven't done the same thing, UT gets more scrutiny
- xiii. Zhao: Motion to amend, can I add on the last be it further resolved, have this sent to the entire legislature
- xiv. Redding: I would accept that as a friendly amendment.
- xv. Redding: These folks in here are the most important, to save space
- xvi. Zhao: Just "The rest of the 83rd Texas Legislature"
- xvii. Gold: Motion to vote by hand: Approved
- b. AR 41 – In Honor of Chief Dahlstrom
 - i. Gold: By chance, by a fortuitous resolution, Chief Dahlstrom is in the back, this was in the works before we knew about any other resolution, thanks for all you have done for students and Austin as a whole, the resolution speaks for itself.
 - ii. Fast-tracked.
 - iii. Old Business: Approved by unanimous consent.
- c. Love: Motion to suspend the rules to hear AR 42 as new business
 - i. AR 42 – In Support of Increasing Police Efficiency, Safety, and Equality Under the Law
 - ii. Love: I would like to invite police chief dahlstrom up to answer some questions, discussed the language, had a lot of common ground
 - iii. Love: The purpose of the bill is to save resources, increase police efficiency and equality under the law regardless of race, religion, sexuality
 - iv. Dahlstrom: Our officers allow 4 oz or not, to use discretion whether or not to make an arrest, the officers can make an arrest under many circumstances, subject to their discretion, often times with Marijuana this is done, campus watch yesterday. Legally a resolution from this body does not obligate us to do anything, but I will take this back to our officers
 - v. Love: Arrests?
 - vi. Dahlstrom:
 - vii. Love: Time frame?
 - viii. Dahlstrom: Depends on the offense, probably an hour or so
 - ix. Love: The benefit of issuing a citation is obvious, the officer
 - x. Dahlstrom: We can go on and on with the circumstances, there is not a benefit other than making sure that person shows up, etc, it depends on the offense, we are not going to write them a ticket and let them loose, a lot of circumstances to each one of those. Always easier when you can write a ticket



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
- xi. Vincent: Thanks for coming out tonight. Do you know the number arrested for marijuana in 2012?
- xii. Dahlstrom: 55 arrested
- xiii. Vincent: Higher efficiency level if this resolution passed?
- xiv. Dahlstrom: The resolution cannot change the way we enforce state law. 1 Per week, its not like we are pulling officers every day to do those types of arrest. Its always a benefit if you can do a citation rather than put someone in jail.
- xv. Vincent: The discretion of the officer based off of warrants, whats the standard procedure, or is it different
- xvi. Dahlstrom: Differs per incident. Found on search, plain sight on traffic site, found in room because of neighbor report. Criminal history, seize the evidence, look for warrants, intoxicated so they cannot sign, if there are no other violations or a small amount, then most of the time they will have a citation issued, if they are being cooperative, I know noone has fake ids, but we come upon them at UT, we come across them and the situation varies
- xvii. Vincent: SDo you think that personally the protection of students is impeded by the enforcement of marijuana laws?
- xviii. Dahlstrom: I do not
- xix. Vincent: Why?
- xx. D: 55 arrests, 1 officer, a large number went to jail for other crimes, so intoxicated they had to be taken
- xxi. Vincent: Do you think the enforcement by all laws are hindered in any way by the current marijuana policy?
- xxii. Dahlstrom: I do not
- xxiii. Houston: Trained in Marijuana policy on campus as an RA, out of 55, what percentage or what part were related to calls related to myself?
- xxiv. Dahlstrom: If I was guessing I would say halfish but I do not know that number
- xxv. Gold: 28 our of 55 were issued citations, some of 27 were taken to jail for other reasons?
- xxvi. Love: IT seems like you are in support of citations when possible
- xxvii. Dahlstrom: Yes, when possible
- xxviii. Mitchell: Racial Difference?
- xxix. Dahlstrom: Since 2006, white and Hispanic, asian and African American, white and Hispanic 3:1 over anyone, no disparity whatsoever as far as citations



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- xxx. Love: We talked about language, in the be it further resolved, do you like “Unless conditions dictate otherwise” is that flexible enough to understand that police have obligations but
- xxxi. D: That will cover most of it
- xxxii. Logan: 4 ounces or left and been a danger?
- xxxiii. Dahlstrom: 2 ounces or less class b, 2-4 is a class b, they acan write a citation for either. Very few officers would write a citation for four ounces, its a lot more than just personal use, prevent overcrowding. Since 2006 we have only made 5 arrests for class A
- xxxiv. Dimitroff: Just to clarify, you said that since 2010, you said that 3:1
- xxxv. Dahlstrom: 318 arrests from 2006, White/Hispanic, 259 arrests, 36 black, 18 of Asians.
- xxxvi. Dimitroff: According to the UT website, 5 percent of the UT population is still black
- xxxvii. Kraut: Arrests for cocaine and heroin compared to marijuana?
- xxxviii. Dahlstrom: I don’t have those numbers with me
- xxxix. Dahlstrom: That number is not just students, you cant just compare the student population, we live in the general city
 - xl. Love: If no one has any questions for the chief, I would like to fast-track this legislation to move into voting.
 - xli. Vote: Fast-tracked
 - xlii. Now Old Business:

 - xliv. Love: Ramifications outside UT. People around the country are watching us, saves money, ensures equal protection
 - xlv. Add amendment: Unless circumstances dictate otherwise, would like to hear from yall about what you like and don’t like, I want all of SG to support this.
 - xlvi. Pikckei: Can you take my name off of author and sponsor
 - xlvii. Vincent: Whereas 4. How is that relevant considering that dahlstrom said that they are not
 - xlviii. Love: Education is always on the chopping block in the legislature, not resource strained now, but if we cut the money, they can be, its to emphasize to say that police resources are valuable, don’t have unlimited money
 - xliv. Vincent: Just a clarification question: Paragraph 7, is that the same issue
 - l. Love: We wanted to show support for the police and show that they are doing good work



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- li. Vincent: How does this relate to the purpose of the bill. Do you think that it is important o emphasize that?
- lii. Love: Among violent crime, homicide is 0.
- liii. Vincent: Regarding resource restraint, if we are seeing statistics that UTPD is doing a fantastic job,
- liv. Love: We aren't changing policy, we are supporting the current policy, saying we like that they write citations,
- lv. Vincent: Can you explain the the statement you made about the ramifications?
- lvi. Love: I hope (clarify)
- lvii. Vincent:
- lviii. Love: What starts here changes the world, if they adopt or continue a policy that sg supports, they say well does that make sense? Does that help my university or my department? People watch what we do here
- lix. Vincent: In light of chief dahlstroms comments earlier, would you be in favor of slashing whereas 11
- lx. Love: I think that it is important to note that. He said what?
- lxi. Dimitroff: He said we cant selectively talk about what those numbers said about students demographics of Austin, 2x greater rate than what the demographics of Austin say, arrest rate in unfairly implemented
- lxii. Vincent: Can you take out the numbers as a national statistics and just say that disparities exist.
- lxiii. Love: If we do that will you support this legislation?
- lxiv. Vincent: Not yet
- lxv. Gold: In the first be it resolved, it says that based upon scientific evidence, we support that marijuana should not be classified as a schedule 1 narcotic
- lxvi. Love: Hardest drugs, no medicinal purpose, highly addictive, it has been there since 1970, federal government has refused to reclassify it. Prescription THC is a class 1, persecuting marijuana like heroin, or cocaine, its not as addictive, make sure that we are supporting policy that we aren't persuing marijuana users like it is that addictive or the most dangerous substance on earth
- lxvii. Davis: Some people in this assembly question and have a problem because the intent of the legislation isn't reflective of the language, national problem vs. local issue.
- lxviii. Logan: I know you research the deaths caused by marijuana, did you research the crimes or the behavior associated with it.
- lxix. Love: Zero. I did not look at that
- lxx. Logan: I mean the dangers it would be causing other students?



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- lxxi. Dimitroff: Ask again?
- lxxii. Logan: You didn't research injury, accidents, assault caused by marijuana usage?
- lxxiii. Dimitroff: I would say from my general knowledge of marijuana those things are not associated with marijuana use
- lxxiv. Das: Piggybacking off of what was just said and what dahlstrom said: Marijuana coupled with other substances.intoxication?
- lxxv. Love: Sure, and no, we did not look at marijuana in combination with alcohol, crack, pcp, heroin, cocaine, who knows whats going to happen. The focus of this legislation is to encourage UTPD to issue citations when people are found with less than 4 ounces of marijuana, which is current travis county law
- lxxvi. Love: What he said they are allowed to issue them for up to 4, 6 in the past 6 years for 2-4, Class A vs. Class B
- lxxvii. Houston: Whether or not a citation or arrest is given, the charge is the same?
- lxxviii. Love: You can get citations for both of them, Class A and Class B
- lxxix. Vincent: Can you speak on behalf of your particular constituents, can you mention past interviews, past meetings you have had with other organizations, it scares me that we are fast-tracking something that might not get approved with another assembly
- lxxx. Question and answer closed, debate:
- lxxxii. Debate:
- lxxxiii. Vincent: Four main issues, first concern is fast-tracking, it scared me because they feel that a different body might not approve the same issue, they personally don't feel like another body, not accurately representing the body. With regard to the issues, budgest, resource efficiency, budget is a non-issue, not constrained, resource efficiency, he felt there was no issue, drug classification, falls way outside the perview of SG, going way beyond what we are qualified with as reps to do, no authorization to change the enforcement of current law, wouldn't change anything, underlying intent, pushing towards a pro-marijuana opinion, these statements
- lxxxiiii. Dimitroff: Your concern is that you think the justification of fast-track is that the current authors. Dimitroff the only current officer that will be serving another term, I was in the meeting where we reworked this, the only reason given for fast-tracking this bill was past precedent. This has another ground in a new assembly, currently it seems to be cohesive with current practivce, I don't see a problem.
