Many thanks for 2 post-cards and a letter. Too late for further changes in KT2 (or is it 3), but most of what you report are in already. First batch of photos of KN tablets have gome in, now being printed, so have not yet been able to study in detail. These will form basis for a thorough revision. Greeks are being difficult and want to hold the negatives.

I have a research student (Irish) who wants to work on Lin. B; I can dissuade him, but am wondering if you would think it an insult, if I put him on to duplicate your work on KN hands, at least in part. Not that I don't trust you, but I think that you would appreciate a second opinion, if reliable. The point is: what actual subject can I give him which will not be superseded by your work within 3 years? I thought of a study of the KN livestock tablets, starting with their epigraphy, hands, scribal procedure and organisation; ? location of find-spots, etc. Would you let me know, urgently, what you think of this; or if you can suggest something better, which is not likely to be done elsewhere. If you have a job in mind you would like someone to tackle, here is a chance. It must of course be suitable for althesis.

I look forward to having some copies of the MV correspondence, so that we can sort out the chronology in more detail. I've used some of the quotations for my lecture on Wednesday in

London. (This won't be printed.)


