



Reviewed Today

The Best Jungle Romancing.
METRO - GOLDWYN-MAYER's
"Tarzan, the Ape Man," at the Queen, is a swell show. As a frankly and gorgeously spurious picture of wild animal life and jungle adventure, it is an exceptionally entertaining and artistic screen production. An adaptation of the Edgar Rice Burroughs story, manufactured on the home grounds of Hollywood, where the apes, crocodiles, lions, tigers, dwarfs, elephants, and gorillas are better acquainted with their histrionic duties and can discharge them more effectively, the picture represents a treatment of such material probably as engrossing as the screen has reflected. Johnny Weissmuller, Maureen O'Sullivan, C. Aubrey Smith, and Neil Hamilton have leading roles in the story which is probably familiar to every person who can read four sentences in a row without getting a headache. Under the directorial tutelage of W. S. "Trader Horn" Van Dyke and the remarkable camera work of Harold Rosson and Clyde de Vinna, the picture is created with a fine sense of the values interpreted. Foremost of these s is a fantastic romancing with the term used, not in its delimited appropriation to biologicals and amours, but in its real application to extravagant and engrossing imaginativeness. Such fabulous heroics have been labeled as appealing to mankind chiefly when his race and his civilization are yet young, but in some respects mankind is ever young. Prominent also among the values of "Tarzan, the Ape Man" are human nature, animal nature, an almost poetic beauty of scenery, and occasionally inspired sense of
