
Dear Doctor Stenzell:

Sometime during the latter part of November some men hunting near Cold Springs, Texas found the skull of one of those Miocene Mastodons, and covered it with plaster and took it to their home in Huntsville. I went there December the first to see it. It is crushed some but reasonably entire and is a good specimen. We have it here at the A. and M. College. One of our students made a sketch of it natural size, and I am sending you a photograph of his sketch. The specimen is about forty-two inches long and twenty-four inches high, and I am confident a skillful man could make a successful mount of it.

About thirty days ago they found in that same locality what seems to be the skull of a deer that had two horns above the eyes and a long horn ten or twelve inches long above the nose. We have that here also, but it is still in the plaster. We have not found anything else recently of unusual interest.

The Texas Academy of Science intends to have their meeting here in November. I hope you can manage to meet with us.
