Dear Dr. Hertlein :

Recently I have read your paper on "A new gryphaeoid cyster from the Ecoens of California." It seems that I am now in the same position you were in when/ou wrote this paper. There are before me several species of Tertiary cysters which need to be described. They obviously be long to different generic branches and one would hesitate to describe them all under the name "Catrea." However, nomenclatorial tangles are so bad in the Catreidae and knowledge of the range of the various generals so small that one would hesitate to use any generic name other than the well-worn Catrea.

I have tried to run down the original descriptions and generic type species of the various genera. Among these Gryphan has caused me a lot of trouble. (Here is where your paper comes in.) It is generally assumed that Lamarok (Anim. e. Vert.) is the author of that name. However, G. P. Deshayes (1824, Descrips, des coquilles fessiles des environs de Paris, vol. 1, p. 326, 332) states that Bruguiere used the name before Lamarok on one of the plates of the Encyclopedie methodique. We do not have the Encyclopedie here, and I have not been able to borrow this book. Therefore, it remains to be seen whether Bruguiere used Gryphan as a valid name and what the original species were. Do you by any chance know about this? If you could shed some light on this question I would apprediate it.
