


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Reevaluation of program and policies takes place in ongoing fashion at the Hogg Foundation. As grant requests are examined, self-study questions are posed concerning the ways in which the Foundation can be most effective in communities throughout the state. The semi-annual National Advisory Council meetings provide a forum for such examination and query. Some of the questions which have arisen in the past year are these:



Do change agents polarize a community? Or, stated differently, how can change come about without such polarization?

Should the Foundation role be to help communities think through the philosophy of their requests for funds?

Is community mental health characterized as helping the powerless achieve influence in orderly fashion?

Is it possible to be influential in directing revenue sharing monies into social services and health as well as into sewage and waste disposal systems? Should the broad educational role of the Hogg Foundation be expanded? Are conferences a vehicle for such communication? Do they serve to link the academic and community groups in common endeavor?

Are there strategies to help keep programs viable, or does the "wheel" need to be reinvented every ten years? History demonstrates forward and backward movements in education, institutionalization, and other community efforts.

PROGRAM AREAS

Program emphases during 1974-75 have continued many project directions of previous years. An increasing weighting toward needs of children can be witnessed in grants of varying magnitude. Some of the larger ones went for establishment or continuation of Institutes of Human Development, aid with day care centers, infant development programs, health and mental health clinics. and educational programs aimed primarily at deprived populations. Geographically the grants spanned the State of Texas, from the Valley region with its large Mexican-American populations, to far West Texas and into other counties where children's needs are manifold. Preventive efforts keynoted some of the endeavors regarding early childhood education and field testing of such programs. Intervention marked other programs dealing with creative arts for school youngsters with problems and work with disadvantaged youth in some of the largest urban areas as well as some of the poorest rural ones. Finally, curative endeavors were seen in projects on behalf of seriously mentally ill young people.

Student populations of college age were foci of still other grants dealing with some of the possible problem areas of living arrangements, career plans, and health and mental health needs. Many of these programs were broadly based and encompassed specific needs of less advantaged groups.

Within the community structure (and often in conjunction with University efforts) were such programs as a broad-based counseling street ministry, an evolving and changing emphasis in work with incarcerated youth, special problem area programs (as education of unmarried mothers, rape counseling centers, work with women in prison), and jointly-planned and funded community mental health programs.

The increase in population of persons 65 and older is mirrored in the Foundation's grants for 1974–75. One demonstration is a day care center encompasing multiple activities on behalf of older people. Another program is directed toward Mexican–American senior citizens; still another is focused on the mental health aspects of good dental and health care.

EVALUATIONS

Evaluations may be undertaken in a number of ways. Although the Hogg Foundation has never served as an evaluation agency in conjunction with programs, a new thrust toward systematic evaluation of projects has emerged. In order to accomplish such evaluation, the Hogg Foundation has enlisted the aid of two graduate interns to examine some of the major continuing endeavors in which the Foundation is involved.

OUTREACH

"Translation" may have several connotations in an era of Soyuz and Apollo. One Hogg Foundation function gives it still another meaning.

Rooted in the University of Texas soil, the Foundation spreads branches into communitities throughout the State of Texas. The translation of studies, needs, and services into community development is one such method employed by way of consultation, technical assistance, outreach function, selected conferences, and publications.

The Hogg Foundation thrust, which has long been involved in the "climate" of communities, might be summed up in environmental terms. Ecology may take importance in human as well as inanimate forms. Ecological social service concerns the Foundation. Some examples are these:

Recycling. An alternative school program in one large Texas city has as its population "push outs" from regular classes. As this project matures, it might be a place where teachers are recycled, new teachers are trained, and techniques of multicultural education and humanism are tested, proven, and spun off into the regular class-room.

Rebuilding. Lives which have been shattered by drugs, divorce, mental illness, or other problems often are

rebuilt with the help of others. A program using mutual aid groups to assist with mental health problems has achieved a high degree of statistical and personal success.

Restructuring. Supportive work in the area of youth correction has been of value both in helping to restructure the program itself and in redesigning methods of returning troubled youth to the community.

Reclaiming. The reclamation of human lives has been a goal of a South Texas project with which the Hogg Foundation has been connected for several years. Here monies have gone for the training of mental health outreach workers who render a variety of human services within the community and under the control of the Department of Public Welfare.

Concern of Foundation executive committee members continues to focus on the mental health "balance" in local communities.

MENTAL HEALTH EDUCATION

Considerations in the Mental Health Education program took form both philosophical and practical. In the former deliberations concern was shown for the growth and maturity in publications and for ways of making materials relevant for today's society. On the practical side the staff faced the increased deluge of print materials and the rising costs of printing and mailing.

A regular mailing list of 10,241 receives quarterly publications reflecting the Hogg Foundation's involvement financially and/or intellectually. Innovation and replication possibilities are criteria for selection of possible publications.

In addition, "The Human Condition," a radio series produced by Radio Station KUT, completed its fourth year of national distribution via the Longhorn Radio Network and international distribution on the Voice of America. An off-shoot from the shows has been the development of conversational leaflets from some of the interviews. These are distributed to the regular mailing list as well as to specialized groups. The cassette recordings of the programs, which are sent out on a loan basis via the Foundation's Library facilities, have been requested more than 650 times for use by community groups, state mental health groups, social service agencies, educational institutions and church organizations throughout the United States and Canada.

LIBRARIES

Regional Foundation Library

The Regional Foundation Library collection, housed at the Hogg Foundation, is more extensive than most of the other depositories in the United States because of the varied amount of information that is kept. In addition to all of the IRS tax forms for the foundations in the Southwest, information on the larger national foundations is collected. Included in the library are books, pamphlets, and articles which deal with the general subject of philanthropy as well as several directories of foundations from other states and Canada.

Hogg Foundation Library

The Hogg Foundation Library, a collection of approximately 1500 books, 3000 pamphlets and 16 serials dealing with various aspects of mental health, has varied uses as a selected collection for specific graduate students. In addition to serving as a staff resource, it is available to mental health professionals and lay persons throughout the state.

A new section on evaluation has been added to the collection.

The Person in Higher Education

The Person in Higher Education collection contains both published and unpublished materials dealing with many aspects of the college community. It includes mimeographed reports, books, magazine articles, and other documents useful to persons concerned with the role of students, faculty, administrators, and governing boards in colleges and universities.

Hogg Family Books

Approximately 150 volumes from the Hogg family library are on display in this library. These include favorites in the general or classics field, some of Will Hogg's law books, and others on the topics of psychology and mental hygiene.

MONOGRAPH SERIES

A monograph series of hardbacked books reports on significant research completed with some assistance from the Hogg Foundation. Eleven such books now bear the Hogg Foundation imprint, the most recent of which is Personality Development in Two Cultures by Wayne H. Holtzman, Rogelio Diaz-Guerrero and Jon D. Swartz.

CONFERENCE ROOM USE

The Hogg Foundation Conference Room serves as a setting for various committee and planning sessions in which Hogg Foundation members are involved. It is used for mental health seminars and for staff meetings.

When not otherwise booked, the room is made available for board meetings of groups whose membership includes Foundation personnel. During 1974-75 it was the location of three graduate seminars taught by staff members of the Hogg Foundation.

Other University groups needing a meeting place also have used the Foundation's conference room.

During the 1974-75 year 48 meetings were held in the conference room.


