Dear Dr. Steyert,

Just time for a note to let you know what I'm doing and where I am. I have been assigned to the Intelligence and Reconnaissance of the Infantry. I am stationed at Camp Tammie north of Lyles about five miles. We have 7 weeks of basic training and 10 weeks of technical training. This is really rough. We are on the run from 5 am the morning until 10 at night and I really mean on the run.

We receive in 7 weeks what a rifle company receives in 17 weeks. Hirsch is here with me. We get a lot of map work, aerial photographs, etc.

It will be our job to work all around and behind enemy lines setting up observation posts, locating the enemy - his position and strength - mapping the terrain through which the Infantry must move to attack. Then report this

back to regimental head quarters.

It isn't very dangerous; the casualty percentage is only 87%. I've been trying decipher some of the geology around the camp, and it has me stumped. I've seen stuff that looks like Reklaw, Green City, Welch, and Sparta all within a very small area. I've even seen large pieces of a sandstone that is a dead ringer for the blower, but as far travel been unable to find any exposures.

I should like to hear some geological if you heard the same. How is my management coming? Tell everyone hello, and tell Warren to enjoy every precious moment of civilian life.
