Please accept my thanks for continuing to send me courtesy copies of the Travaux du Laboratoire de Paleontologie. I am very happy to have them, because they enable me to keep up with new ideas and methods originating at Orsay. I hope you will continue to send future publications to me.

In reading the travau by Daniele Gaspard, I found that Oleneothyris harlani (Morton, 1828) is assigned to the Senonien. However, this brachiopod species is found abundantly in the Hornerstown Formation and the Vincentown Formation, both of which are now assigned to the Lower Eocene. There is not a single annonite or belemnite to be found in these two formations, and there is no doubt nowadays that they are of Tertiary age. About 50 years ago they were erroneously regarded as Cretaceous. I am enclosing xerox copies of two cards from the Catalogue of type Invertebrate Fossils of North America (Eocene) which I published years ago.
