Selection of the play to be given during the fall term, first attempts at casting the play, and presentation of newly elected members marked the special meeting of the Curtain Club, held Thursday night in the club's S. Hall studio.

The play selected which will be presented sometime during the fall term and the exact dates of which will be announced at a later date, is Noel Coward's "Hay Fever" which has just finished a successful run in New York. "Hay Fever" comes as a fitting successor to "The Vortex," the play which brought Mr. Coward fame and fortune.

New Material

Many of the new members of the club will be seen in "Hay Fever." Several members were tried in various parts Thursday night in order to feel out the new material and determine what other material the club needed.

Final selection for parts will be made within the next few days, according to George Wolfe, president of the club, and if any more men are needed a special tryout session for men will be held to secure the necessary material.

Knight Elected By Middle Laws

Review Editor Named Class President After Hot Race

A. V. Knight of Austin was yesterday elected president of the middle law class in the University Law School. A. S. Haddaway of Fort Worth was elected vice-president and Fannie Boyls of San Antonio was named secretary-treasurer of the class. Bill Ryan of Laredo was elected speaker of the middle laws by acclamation.

Knight holds one of the highest scholastic records in the School of Law, having been one of the ten members of the class to be invited to help edit the Texas Law Review. He was elected over strong opposition in four candidates.

Ryan, a well-known Varsity debater and former debate star from St. Edward's University, will represent the middle law class at the annual law banquet in November.

Arizona To Break With Mines School

The University of Arizona, by order of the board of control, will discontinue after this year all athletic contests with the Texas School of Mines. The school gave as its reason that the Mines school refused to discontinue the use of athletes who had four years of previous varsity competition.

The order given to Graduate Manager Louis Slonaker was that no more contests shall be scheduled with schools that do not have a four-year eligibility rule, and a one-year resident requirement for transfer.

Brown Math Test Taken by Forty

Twenty Papers Are Sub- mitted From Those Who Take Tests

Papers were submitted by 20 students in the Brown mathematical contest for freshmen held yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. A total of 40 students were given lists of questions at the beginning of the contest period. Questions were taken from plane geometry and algebra.

The winners of the contest will probably be announced early next week. Dr. H. J. Ettlinger, who was in charge of the contest, said. Prizes of \$15, \$10, and \$5 are offered.

The Brown mathematical contest was established in 1917 by a member of the faculty. Records of past contests, according to Dr. Ettlinger, show that 80 per cent of the winners are graduates of small-town high schools.

700 Rooters Will Attend Vandy Game

More than 700 Texas rooters will attend the Vanderbilt game in Dallas Saturday it was disclosed by official figures from the office of the director of athletics last night. The ticket sale closed at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon with a mad rush for the few remaining seats.

Only a very small number of rooter tickets were returned to Dallas, a larger number of students having bought tickets than was expected.

No definite figures are yet available as to the complete ticket sales for the game because three sales are being conducted simultaneously, one in Austin, and two in Dallas.

It is estimated, however, that sales have already amounted to 50 per cent more than at this time in any previous year. Indications are, according to Mellmont, that the last minute rush will make a complete sell-out. Every provision will be made to take care of an emergency should the seating capacity of the Fair Park stadium prove insufficient.

Varsity Land Sale Effort Frustrated

Recent attempts, made by certain West Texas counties, to force the sale of more than 1,000,000 acres of land, belonging to the University located in their bounds, have come to naught. The supreme court refused to allow El Paso, Hudspeth, Reagan, Scheicher, Martin, and Upton counties to mandamus the University Board of Regents to sell the land within their bounds. These counties based their petition on the grounds that the land bore no taxation and further appealed to the constitutional duty of the court.

Representative J. H. Boggs, of San Angelo, leader of the West Texas opposition, has for many years fought to force the sale of the land. He claimed the counties did not receive enough money to operate because of tax exemption on the land.

The German club was organized last year to foster the speaking of German by the students of the Germanic languages in the University, and has been very successful in its work during the past year, president Curt Schmidt said.

Election Rules Explained For Campus Voters

Davis Announces Method of Holding Polls Tuesday

Electioneering to Be Checked

With approximately 50 candidates out for campus offices to be filled in the Students' Assembly, the Women's Assembly, and the Women's Honor Council, complete regulations and system of voting have been announced by Edwin Davis, judge in charge of the election.

"A clear statement of the system of voting at the University has been found particularly desirable, largely on account of the freshmen having for their first time the privilege of the ballot," Davis has pointed out.

Duty To Vote
"The vote, as pertains both to first-year students and upper-classmen, is at once a right and a duty," he continued. "A complete ballot of between 2000 and 3000 is expected in the returns from the election next Tuesday."

Rules as formulated last spring term and as they will apply to Tuesday's election are as follows:

Each school votes only for its representatives.

In the College of Arts and Sciences men will vote only for the men representatives to the Student Assembly, and women will vote only for the women representatives to that body.

Only women will vote for members of the Women's Honor Council.

Electioneering Check
Only women will vote for members of Women's Assembly, and they will vote only for the representatives of their own class.

Boxes will be placed at convenient places.

The preferential system of voting will be used entirely, no ballots to be scratched, but the preference of candidates marked number 1, number 2, and so on.

No electioneering will be allowed in buildings in which ballot boxes are placed or on the steps of such buildings.

Expense accounts of candidates must be filed with Frances Foster, secretary of the Students' Association, by noon of election day, whether any expense has been incurred or not.

Tributes Paid To Texas Editor

John W. Stayton Dies at His Home in Dallas

John W. Stayton, a former student of the University, and until 1918 the editor of Holland's Magazine, died Wednesday afternoon at his home in Dallas. He was a brother of Robert W. Stayton, professor of law in the University at the present time.

Students of the Law School sent flowers. Judge Stayton's classes have been suspended for the remainder of the week, it has been arranged.

John W. Stayton was recognized as one of Texas' most outstanding newspaper men and won a wide reputation as a naturalist.

In 1918 he was forced to retire from active editorship of Holland's Magazine due to a tumor of the brain, which had given him trouble for some past years, and which finally caused his death.

Stayton is survived by his wife, a daughter, Mildred, a son, John W. Stayton, Jr., his mother, a sister, Mrs. Birge Holt of Corpus Christi, and two brothers, George K. Stayton of Pyote and Robert W. Stayton of Austin.

Moore Pleads For Rooters to Inspire Steers

Dean Says Outcome of Game Rests With Student Body

Ed Beular Talks at Rally Also

"It will take more than their best for our team to beat Vanderbilt, and it is up to you, the student body of the University, to furnish what it takes more than that," Dean of Students V. I. Moore told an enthusiastic gathering at the rally at the Men's gym last night.

Dean Moore, himself a graduate of Vanderbilt, publicly renounced his allegiance to his former alma mater and pledged himself anew to his adopted institution. He compared himself to an alien who during the world war had to choose between loyalty to his fatherland and his new country.

Cites Hospitality

"I have been welcomed to this university with open arms," he continued. "And I wish to emphasize that I have always found cordial hospitality awaiting me here. That is characteristic of this school. Anyone, no matter whether he has previously given his allegiance to another institution or not, is welcomed into the inner circles of this university."

"I have known transfers here to be elected cheer leader, captain of the football team, and leaders of all our campus organizations."

"The days when I was a Vanderbilt man are yesterday. Today, I am a Texas man. When that team of ours has put forth everything it has, we will give it what it takes to make a man fight harder than he knows how to. That something will push them down the field and across the line for a win over Vanderbilt."

A special stunt was presented by the freshmen, who depicted a prophecy of the outcome of the Commodore-Longhorn clash in the form of a naval battle. The Vandy men were forced to walk the plank.

A number of yells were given, and the band played the accompaniment for one song, in which the girls participated.

Beular Will Cheer Team

Eddie Beular, disabled Longhorn star, spoke on behalf of his teammates. He said, in part: "You may be out-yelling Vandy Saturday, but Rufus King and I will be on the sidelines yelling louder than you are."

The team will leave at 11:30 this morning for Dallas. A rally will be held at the station as a sendoff, provided the student body wants it, according to Gene German, head cheer leader. "If they want it, they will be there," he said.

German urged the rooters who are going to Dallas to help him in making the Texas rooting section the stronger section for that day. He also requested that all the students be at the Adolphus Hotel at 10:30 Saturday for a special rally and parade together with the band and Cowboys.

Longhorns Ready for Battle with Vandy

Movie Teaches Co-Eds How to Stand Straight

Music and Films Show Girls Secrets of Correct Posture

Attending a movie, in a regular theater with all of the atmosphere of a popular film, and hearing modern music played by a professional of this sort of entertainment and in addition music which fitted in well with the particular part of the movie shown was the lucky lot of the co-eds attending the posture film shown at the Texas Theater Wednesday and Thursday instead of the regular P. T. classes.

The film stressed defects of hollow back, sunken chest, and drooping head positions and gave gymnastic exercises for correcting each of these defects and presented the correct posture. The film presented the defects on a normal subject and then on a skeleton, and during the showing of the latter phase the pianist very cleverly gave a rendition of the "Churchyard Anthem," which speaks of "going down to the cemetery never to come back."

One of the most attractive portions of the film was the showing of the part which posture plays in good technique of sports, through the presentation of the tennis playing of Helen Wills, the baseball pitching of Walter Johnson, and the all-around athletic ability of Douglas Fairbanks, in slow-motion pictures.

At the end of each showing of the film, Miss Leah Gregg, director of the posture and individual gymnastic department for women, gave a short talk on posture and stressed the number of foot defects noted on the new students during the medical examinations, and urged the girls to wear good-looking, sensible sport shoes for school wear.

At each class hour, the girls were led in singing Texas rally songs by Mrs. Tex Lynn, acting girls' song-leader, and a representative elected from the group which represented all the women's P. T. classes meeting at that hour on that day, for a committee to meet with the new girls' song-leader, to be elected Monday night at the big girls' rally, to plan the part which the girls shall have in participating at the rallies and games and supporting Coach Littlefield and the team. This committee will also plan the stunt which the girls are to put on at the A. & M. rally and to form a means of communicating with the rest of the co-eds through announcements in the P.T. class of their hour.

Starving Campus Rhymesters Get Chance to Sing for Cash Prizes

Here is a chance for some brilliant student to gain fame and also be benefitted financially. The merchants on the campus have offered the following prizes for the best contribution, both in the fields of poetry and prose, made to The Longhorn.

A \$50 prize is offered by the Texas Book Store for the best short story in The Longhorn during the year 1927-1928. All students of the University are eligible to compete with the exception of the editor-in-chief of The Longhorn. They are: the Southern Memorial Association contest, for historical one-acts; the Oak Cliff Little Theater of Dallas contest; and the Dallas Little Theater contest. The Penn Publishing Company announced the other contest which is for long plays only.

Veteran Dies of Old War Injury

Lieut. Maud Succumbs to Effects of Being Gassed in France

Lieut. John Elmer Maud, former student of the University of Texas and an officer of the 360th infantry overseas, died at the city hospital at 6 o'clock Thursday morning. His death, which followed a very brief illness, was the result of being gassed in the trenches during the world war.

Funeral services will be held at the Thurlow B. Weed funeral home. Company D, 141st Infantry, Texas National Guard, will act as funeral escort.

Maud entered the University in 1914. When war was declared between the United States and Germany, he was one of the first men of the University to enlist. Recently he and ten other Austin men were awarded the Cross of Honor by the United Daughters of the Confederacy for valor overseas.

Famed As Athlete

Following the war, Maud entered the University again and attended until 1924. For a time he was in the School of Law. During his University period, he distinguished himself in both football and track under Coaches Dave Allerdice and William E. Metzenthoin respectively. His outstanding work in the latter field won for him two special medals.

While in the University, Maud was a member of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity. At the time of his death he was a member of Austin Lodge No. 12, A. F. & A. M., Austin Scottish Rite Masons, and the American Legion.

Team to Hold Last Workout This Morning

Littlefield Expects Steers to Lose Game Because of Injuries

One light workout on the green turf of Memorial Stadium this morning will complete the training of the Longhorns, preparatory to the clash with Vanderbilt Saturday. As soon as this signal drill is completed, Coach Littlefield and his Orange warriors will leave on the M-K-T Texas Special for Dallas.

The Longhorns have just completed a week of strenuous preparation for the Vandy fray and are in good shape for the game, if the fact that Beular and Captain King are definitely out of the game and that Rose has only a bare possibility of entering are discounted. But Coach Littlefield is not inclined to discount these factors.

Ready for Worst

The Longhorn mentor has been preparing for the worst. He is apparently disturbed over the injuries suffered by these three stars and plans to rely a great deal on the fighting quality of the Steers to gain victory. Littlefield believes the worst result of the loss will be felt in that with these men out the unity of the club will be weakened. He has not one team that he can call his first string, due to a succession of bad breaks all season, and the Texas team will be handicapped in that the men who start the game have not been playing together all season as a single club.

The past week, however, has done much in helping the Texas team to acquire this quality. For the last several days, it has been certain that these men would not appear in the game, and the club that has worked together all this week is the one that will get the call when the opening whistle blows Saturday. Joe King, Johnnie Estes, Leo Baldwin, and Tommie Hughes will likely compose the quartet in the backfield, a combination which presents a good threat when looked at from any viewpoint.

Texas expects an aerial game from the Commodores, and a great deal of practice this week has been directed in breaking up pass attacks flung from Vanderbilt formations by the freshmen. But Littlefield is too wise to rely too much on these formations, for he realizes that he is facing a master of strategy in Dan McGugin, a coach who is always ready to show a bagful of tricks to any team. Vanderbilt has seen practically none of the Texas plays, because the Nashville scouts were forced to watch the Longhorns fight in the mud, but it is likely that the Texans will be shown many unexpected plays by the Commodores. It has been defense that has been stressed at the Memorial Stadium this week, and it is likely that much of the Texas play will revolve around the saying that "a good defense is the best offense."

A squad of 36 men, including coaches, trainers, and managers, will be taken to Dallas. The players who will make the trip are: Rufus King, Higgins, Hughes, Joe King, Rhoads, Cowley, McCullough, Ford, Wray, Tigner, Baldwin, Sewell, Allen, Estes, Beular, Rose, Boyles, Phillips, Brown, Rees, Hammonds, Cox, Beatty, Reynolds, Whitsell, Burnett, Wilbanks, Beard, McLemore, and Cheatham.

Texas fans may once more rely on identifying the players by number in this game. The weather forecast for the week promises a good day for the game, with at least an approximation of real football weather, something that the Longhorns have not yet experienced this season. In addition, the regular jerseys will be worn in place of the old ones that were donned in the recent mud battles.

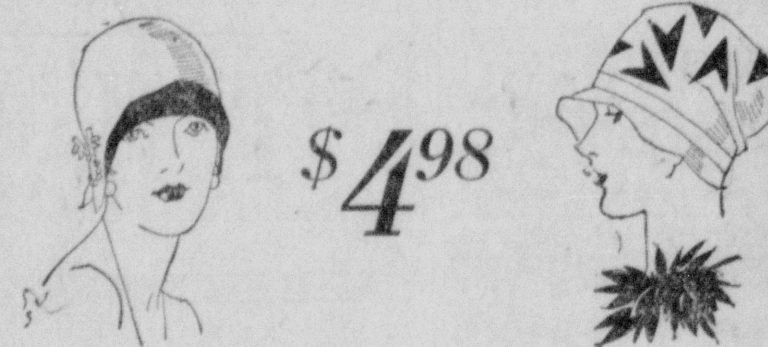
