

## VOYLES SUCCEEDS EDWIN TAEGL AS FOREMAN COWBOYS

Co-operation Necessary for  
Success of Pep Organiza-  
tion, Voyles Says

## ELECTION IS UNANIMOUS

McGill Stresses Interest of  
Cowboys in First Year  
Men

With the election of Claud Voyles as foreman to succeed Ed. Taegel, who resigned, the Cowboys opened their first regular bi-weekly luncheon at the Cafeteria Thursday at 1 o'clock. During the course of the luncheon, Richard Blalock, former foreman of the Cowboys and chairman of the meeting, announced to the members of the Cowboys the resignation of Taegel from the office of foreman.

In resigning, Taegel explained in a letter to Blalock the difficulty he would have in devoting the proper amount of time to the organization this year, but assured the former foreman that his services were at all times at the command of the Cowboys and that his deepest feelings were for the boys and their work.

After the election of Voyles, which was unanimous, the new foreman made an address before the assembly in which he stated the

The election was postponed until the new members are taken in. Last year the personnel of the club included forty-eight members. The officers are Minerva Cunningham, president; Lillian Augsbarger, vice president; Laura Rissman, secretary; Madge Whiteside, treasurer; and Aline Calhoun, librarian.

Fox, who is superseding Miss Elfreda Littlejohn as director of the Girls Glee Club, is the director of the St. Mark's Church Choir of San Antonio. He has been a conductor of musical organizations, and in addition, is a composer. He has arranged several of the cowboy folk songs appearing in the collection of John A. Lomax into concert form. One of his songs, "Rounded Up in Glory," is included in the Interscholastic League music memory contest. Fox is also conducting the Men's Glee Club this year.

The club plans to have three concerts, one each term, as is customary, stated Miss Cunningham, the president. Nothing definite about plans for a trip has been decided upon this year in the year, she said.

## LIGHT TEAM TO FACE HEAVY FOE

Longhorns Stage Secret Practices Daily; Strong Backfield; Light Line

The foregoing line-up, which represents the strongest eleven Coach E. J. "Doc" Stewart can put on the field at this time, doubtless will start against Southwestern University Pirates here Saturday afternoon in the first game of the season. Reduced prices on seats will assure a large crowd for the initial contest, which is awaited with interest over the state. The Longhorns of 1925 are a question mark and all are anxious to see Coach Stewart's team in action.

Unlike many opening day games in the past, this conflict is certain to be fairly close and hotly contested. The Pirates have a new coach in "Lefty" Edens, former football and baseball star at Southwestern. Several years ago Lefty had a baseball trial with the Philadelphia Athletics and slammed out five home runs in the first practice session, but he never appeared in an American League line-up. He was a whale of a hitter in practice. However, he is destined to shine much better in football. He has been attending Rockne's football schools for several years, is a good fellow and well liked by his associates, and is a natural leader of men. This will be his maiden game, and he will give his all in an effort to start off well. Nine of the eleven regulars of last year's team are back.

It will be remembered that last year the Longhorns were lucky to win by a score of 27 to 0. The Pirates returned the ball on the kick-off to the Longhorn's seven-yard line, and doubtless would have scored but for a fumble. The Pirates battled the Longhorns on even terms

## Correspondence Work During Year 1924-25 5,931 Students Take

During the fiscal year of the University of Texas Division of Extension closed September 1, 5,931 students had taken correspondence work offered by the University, according to information from the office of the director. English courses had the largest enrollment with history and Spanish coming next in order.

Great differences were noticed in the ages of the students. Four were between the ages of 61 and 70. Between 41 and 30 there were 725, and 424 between 31 and 40. Only 105 students were between the ages of 16 and 20 and these were largely students who had attended the University during the long session. Students were enrolled from all vocations including weather bureau officials, train conductors, teachers, ministers, ex-soldiers and many others.

Association

## FROSH URGED TO ATTEND

Mock Trials, Debates and  
Speeches Will Feature  
Bi-monthly Programs

First meeting of the Pre-Law Association will be held tonight at 7:15 in room 9 of the Law Building, with old members and first year men who are planning to enter the Law School present. Freshmen are especially invited to attend.

The following officers will be installed tonight for the fall term: president, Horace Akin; vice-president, A. A. Semaun; secretary-treasurer, Homer Jackson; sergeant-at-arms, Gordon W. Johnson; reporter, J. Sterling Prince.

The Pre-Law Association was founded in 1918, and is a combination of a literary society and departmental association. Its aim is to acquaint prospective lawyers with parliamentary procedure, to give them some idea of the legal profession, to introduce them to some of the traditions of the Law School, and to form friendships which will carry through out life.

Every member is given a chance to participate as often as possible in the varied programs which are rendered at the regular bi-monthly meetings, and occasionally the association is favored with an appropriate talk by some prominent lawyer or professor from the outside.

Mock trials, debates, speeches, humorous and otherwise, are generally the features of the program. The worth of such an organization is attested to by the law faculty and those members of the Law School who were once active in the association.

Aside from these literary meetings, the Pre-Laws are recognized as formidable contenders for the Gill Trophy, having captured it last year by winning last year in football, baseball, and track.

## Fencing Class Begins First of Next Week

Classes in fencing are scheduled to begin the first of next week, according to Melvin Williamson, instructor. Fencing for men will be given on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays at 2 p. m.

Equipment to the value of \$214 has been purchased by the physical training department for use by the class. This equipment includes foils, dueling swords, masks, and sabers.

Classes for women will meet on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3 to 4. Credit for P. T. will be given in both departments. Miss Ellen Jervey will instruct in the women's department, and Williamson will have charge of the men.

An innovation this year will be the fixing of a small term fee for men. The fee will not be more than \$3 per term, Williamson says, and will just about balance the cost of equipment which will be furnished by the department. No other charge will be made except for breakage of blades.

## Special Courses for Adults Offered at Junior College

Special classes have been arranged for adults who do not desire university credit in connection with the Junior College of the University of Texas in San Antonio, being opened in co-operation with the San Antonio Public Schools, according to T. H. Shelby, dean of the University Division of Extension.

Between 150 and 200 are expected to enroll for this instruction which will include courses in business administration, comparative literature, economics, education, English, government, philosophy, psychology, public speaking and sociology. The adult classes will meet once a week for a two hour period, Shelby said.

## STEWART APPEALS FOR MORE SPIRIT

Traditions and Responsibilities  
Stressed by Speakers  
on College Night

Loyal rooters of Varsity will gather tonight at the Men's Gym at 7 o'clock for half an hour of practice on yells in preparation for the Texas-Southwestern grid game Saturday. Bill Rippey, head yell leader, announced at the annual College Night Thursday. Rippey promised that the meeting would not last longer than half an hour and that the only speaking on the program would be in the form of yells.

"The team is going to reflect the kind of spirit the student body presents," Doc Stewart, head football coach, declared at the College Night meeting in an appeal for more spirit on the part of the rooters. "You exhibited wonderful spirit last year, but you only did so spasmodically. Southwestern has a fine chance to win from us Saturday," he stated.

Southwestern Team Heavy  
"Southwestern has a team that will out-weight us ten to twelve pounds per man," Stewart showed by individual comparison that Southwestern had the heavier team. He added that several of Southwestern's athletes were in far better physical condition than any Texas can produce with one or two exceptions.

Stewart also made an appeal for additional football material. He announced that he only had 33 men trying out for places on the squad this week. "I have never had less than twice that number out before," he declared.

Excellent Material  
"Something is wrong with our football situation. The boys are too small and too light to be very valuable in playing the kind of schedule we have to play this year," Stewart added. Stewart said that he believed there was a wealth of excellent football material among the students and urged them to come out on the field and practice.

"We will not make fun of you if you do not make good," he said. "There are many men on this campus that I have seen who would make very valuable material for our football team in a month's time." The traditional "bear meat" cry was sounded last night when Stewart said that the Baylor-Texas game was one game that Texas was going to win this year regardless of the outcome of the others. The students echoed Stewart's sentiments with prolonged cheering.

Sterling Holloway, president of the University Y. M. C. A., presided at the College Night celebration Thursday.

Splawn Talks  
President Splawn was introduced as the first speaker of College night. Splawn warned the student body and especially the freshmen not to let too many interests detract from proper attention to their courses. He scored procrastination as one of the greatest evils that one has to combat. "It may be, however, that one of you may believe you are a budding genius who will flower tomorrow, and hence deem it all right to

Leo Baldwin at end. Longhorn boosters everywhere breath a sigh of relief. At last Texas has an ace at end. Not since George McCullough snatched a high pass in the closing minutes of a memorable A. & M. game several years ago have we seen an end worthy of note. Our eyes will be on the versatile lad from Wichita Falls at the Saturday game.

"A squad of 33 men is what I have to face that schedule with," announced Doc Stewart last night at the Y. M. C. A. rally. Perhaps the size of a team determines its power. At least Notre Dame, the champions of the American Collegiate grid world, have a squad of 300 out for daily practice. There are just about 700 men on our campus capable of wearing the Orange and White in grid competition, says Doc.

The game Friday will see a light green team battle a heavier, and more experienced eleven. But we place our faith in Stewart and his speedy crew. Last year we trounced the Pirates by more than 20 points. This year our coach has already said "You will have no such score Saturday."

Line Coach Bill James, the former Center College co-star with Bo McMillan, is more responsible than even Stewart for Varsity success this year. James' job is to build a line equal to the backfield, if we are to have a well balanced team. With only Heinie Pfann at center as a nucleus, James must literally mold a pair of ends, tackles and guards.

The average fan is anxious to see the Saturday game because of the highly touted uniforms that the Steers will prance around in. A new shade of Orange, rubber shoulder pads, and stick'em stripes on the jerseys are some of the novelties to be donned against the Georgetown school.

From far away West Point comes the news that Bud Sprague is certain to make the squad if not the team. The two-hundred pound tackle has fight, speed, and experience, most of which was developed right here on Clark Field. Each year the Army puts one or more stars on the All-American team. Since the big sports writers of the East refuse to recognize ability in the Southwest Conference, Sprague may get his chance at the recognition so many in Texas deserve.

Now Rice comes forth with another ace on her coaching staff. Ernie Hjertberg, coach of the Irish-American club which produced over half the membership of the 1908 U. S. Olympic team, comes to the Owl school next year. Needless to say, Ernie's biggest job is trying to produce a team near enough to Texas to offer her a little competition.

### Lewis White Attends Harvard This Fall

Lewis White of Houston, University of Texas tennis star, plans to enter Harvard University this fall where he will study law. With Louis Thalheimer of Dallas, White won two consecutive national collegiate tennis tournaments. During the past summer White and Thalheimer defeated LaCoste and Barrota, the French Davis Cup team. during the first half of the game.

Just as pitching is the chief factor in baseball, the line is the chief factor in the success of a football team. The Longhorn line this year averages only 172 pounds per man, which doubtless is by far the lightest line in the conference. The backfield, too, is shy on weight. Coach Stewart has an almost impossible task of producing a winner from such light material, but he may be able to turn the trick.

Very little information can be gained from the Pirates camp. All of their practices are held in private, and Coach Edens is not permitting any publicity to creep out concerning the doings of this team.

It is unofficially reported that nine regulars from last year's team are again in the line-up in addition to four former letter men who did not play last year. Six football stars from the North Texas Aggie College are now numbered among the ranks of the Pirate eleven. Men who will be seen in action Saturday and will be marked by the Longhorns will be Matier, one of the fastest runners in the Southwest; the two Renolda brothers, well known Texas athletes, and Allen, another football flash.

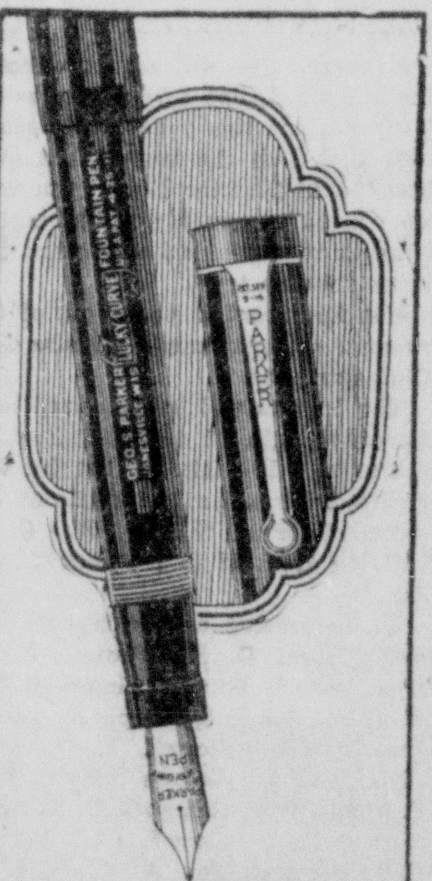

Miss Bernice Green, Y. W. C. A. president, spoke on the services rendered by her organization and the Y. M. C. A.

Richard Blalock, president of the Students' Association, announced that Dads and Mothers Day will come on November 14 this year, the day of the Arizona football game. He urged the students to write home right away and invite them to come to Austin on that day.

### Men's Council Important

"The most important thing about the University," Otis Rogers, president of the Men's Council, said, "is the students' relationship to himself and to his fellow students, his civic responsibility."

"It requires both the intellect and character to make the man," Rogers said, "and the one who has one of these without the other is only half a man." Cheaters were scored by the Council president. Though you can get through this University without being apprehended for cheating, the

world will find you out and will deal piteously with you. The eyes of Texas will discover how you meet your civic responsibility."

Miss Ruby Terrill, new dean of women, explained the function of her office and that of Dean of Men. "The duty of the deans is not to find out what Willie and Mary are doing and to help them to do it."

Following the program, Rippey and his staff were presented with coats trimmed in orange and white. The coats were presented by Claude Voyles, foreman of the Cowboys in behalf of the University Co-op which donated the coats.

Fifteen minutes was devoted to familiar yells, after the speaking. Rippey announced that one additional assistant yell leader would be selected Friday night and asked all who wished to try out to be on hand.

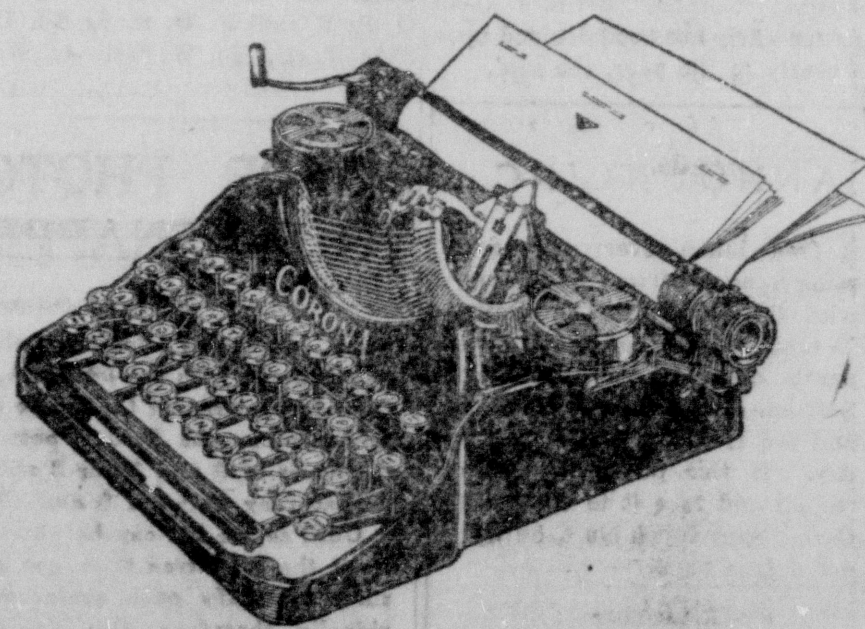

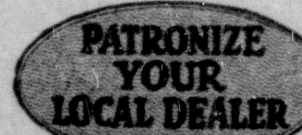

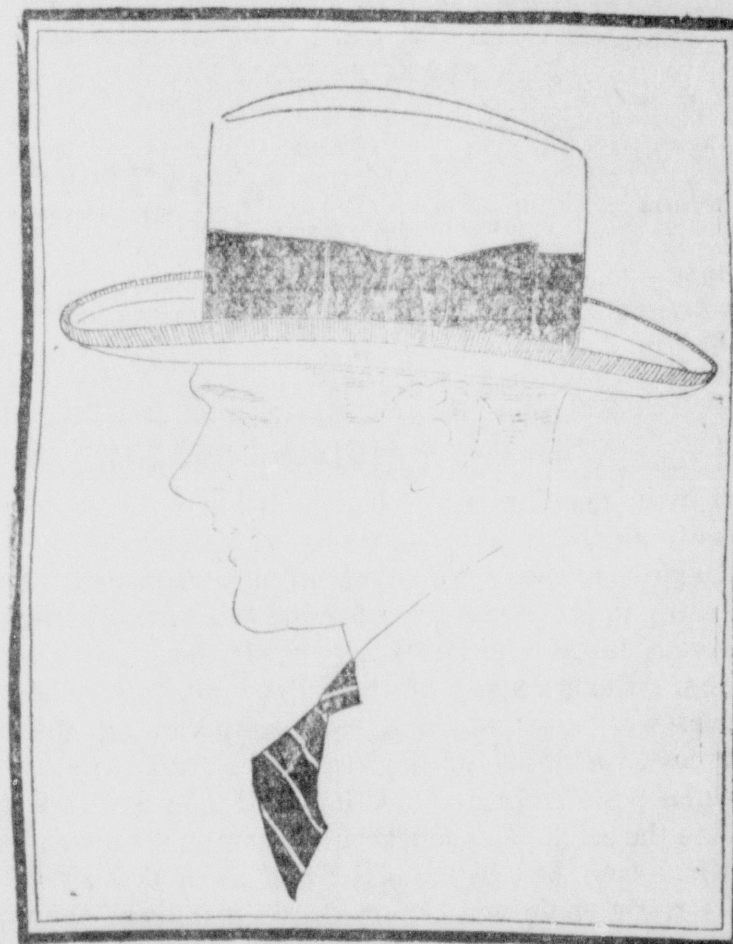

## THE HAND-SHAKING SEASON

With the opening of the University and the seasonal falling of the autumn leaves on the campus, the handshaking season rolls around again as the campus politician purchases a supply of cigars and gum in preparation for the fall term elections.

Already those would-be Tammany leaders have started their campaign, although many of them have not quite made up their mind just what they would like to campaign for this fall; but nevertheless, they have decided to try to grab off some political office when the election is held the third Tuesday in October.

From the sedate and conservative campus student, the would-be political boss has blossomed forth as a democratic person, with his ready smile and cheery "good morning" for every person he meets on the campus, regardless of whether the person is a freshman or a dignified fourth year student.

Soon there will appear in the campus paper the annual write-up of the politician, and included in it will be the names of all his organization affiliations, and what he favors in remodeling the campus government. What he advocates, it may be said, does not usually amount to thirty cents.

The chances are about ten to one that as soon as the October elections are over, the ambitious politician will lapse back into his habit of greeting only those of his own set, and those he showed such a friendly feeling toward while he was trying to establish himself on the campus as a political leader will be completely ignored. This often happens, although it is not the rule.

Don't be alarmed if some person shows an unusual interest in you, and hails you as a long lost brother. It is only the campus politician in action, nothing more or less.

## BLOCKHEADS AND THE "C" AVERAGE

In advising members of the freshman class as to the manner in which they may best fit themselves in their new environment, President Splawn, upon the occasion of the first convocation of the class of '29, warned against participation in too many activities and pointed out that the greatest benefit will be derived from a few activities best suited to the individual. He reminded them, however, that their chief business here is to get an education.

President Splawn, in developing this point, hit upon a happy characterization of the marking system used by the University authorities as an index of the student's progress in the direction of intellectual training. "To make an 'A,'" said Dr. Splawn, "you must be able to give back all you have received with the stamp of your own individuality. To make a 'B' you must be able to give back all that you have received in the same form you receive it. 'C' means that you can give back only portions or fragments of what you received. To graduate with a 'C' average is to enter life with a distinct handicap. A 'C' student is not trained; he loses his chance for culture, and remains a halting ignoramus."

There can be no question of the truth of this statement if it may be assumed that the student enters upon his university career with the conviction that marks are the soul criterion of his progress, and is, therefore, determined to make high marks. Inability to make good marks, then, is an indication of a failure on his part in the purpose to which he has addressed himself. This is doubtless the viewpoint of the average student, if he has any serious purpose at all in mind. But, aside from the relatively small class of avowed campus loafers, there are exceptions to this general rule. There is the instance of the brilliant blockhead, the man who graduates nearer the foot than the head of his class, but who, nevertheless, through some mysterious process, seems to find himself, upon leaving his university, and surpasses the valedictorian in actual achievement.

There are so many conspicuous instances varying from the general rule that mention of one or two cannot be set down as freak exceptions that only prove the rule. Ulysses S. Grant was the goat of his class at West Point. But at Fort Donaldson, when he pitted his generalship against that of his old classmate, the brilliant Buel, he proved himself anything but a halting ignoramus.

A careful reading of Grant's memories will give the clue to this apparent inconsistency. Grant had a rare mathematical mind. He could fulfill the requirements of the Military Academy as to mathematics with little effort. For the rest he spent his time in the library reading the great classics of literature and history. His entire career at the Academy was one of rebellion against any form of discipline. He always received the maximum number of demerits, and he was deprived of his chevrons in his third year for insubordination. He refused either to let his professors interfere with his education or his superior officers to dictate as to his habits of living.

Robert E. Lee, on the other hand, was one of those brilliant, tractable students who enter an institution of learning to be educated by the appointed teaching staff and not to educate themselves. His was an exemplary record, and he graduated at the head of his class. Lee is the classic example of an "A" student. Grant is the example of a poor "C" student who is determined to educate himself and who upsets all attempts at classifying and grouping the intellect according to formal standards.

But, despite the foregoing exception and countless others that might be mentioned, President Splawn's characterization is, in the main, correct. Its difficulty of application is due only to the fact that no system of education has been evolved which can strike a proper balance between the tendency toward standardization, compelled by large and unselected masses of student, and, at the same time, make proper allowances for the student who brings distinctive and truly original powers of intellect to bear on his work, but who will not, or cannot, fit into the group of average mediocrity. As education is handed to the throngs that overcrowd our state universities, this type of student is a greater incubus than the loafing blockhead.

Thus, while the majority of "C" students will go forth into the world having missed their chance for culture, there may be a few "C" students who have developed amazing powers of reason, not by sitting in the lecture room and transforming themselves into note taking machines, but by criticizing in their own minds, everything the lecturer says and doing it intelligently, often brilliantly. Their marks at the final examination will depend largely upon the breadth of mind of the professor giving the course. If the professor in question is only a professor, and not a first rate intellect, the mark, despite every evidence of an ability to think, will be only a "C". There are as many mere professors in our universities as there are brilliant, "C" average blockheads.

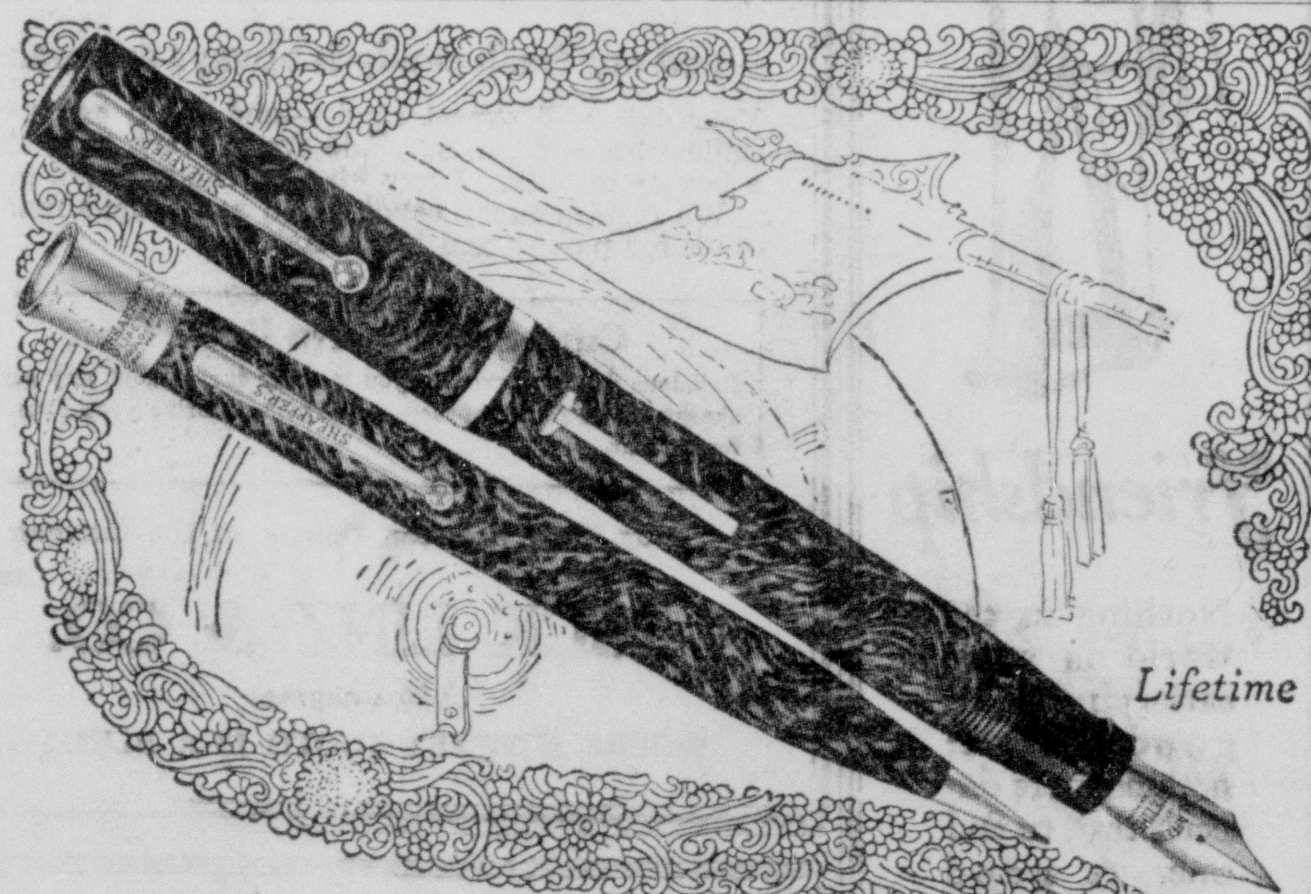

# MORE THAN 500 TEXAS SCHOOLS ENROLL FOR INTERSCHOLASTIC WORK

University of Texas Interscholastic League reports a record enrollment of Texas schools in the league work this year. More than 500 schools enrolled during County Institute week alone, with names coming this week at the daily rate of 40.

Bulletins instructive on numerous phases of this organization are being rapidly printed and distributed to public schools over every part of the state, according to Roy Bedichek, chief of Interscholastic League Bureau. A complete edition of the new spelling bulletin has just been received at the office; 9,000 copies of the one hundred and twenty page bulletin on debate, 8,000 copies of a music bulletin of one hundred pages are being rapidly mailed.

**New Bulletin**  
An entirely new bulletin, "How To Judge a Debate," published for the first time in the history of the league, has for its purpose the standardization of debate judging in Texas schools.

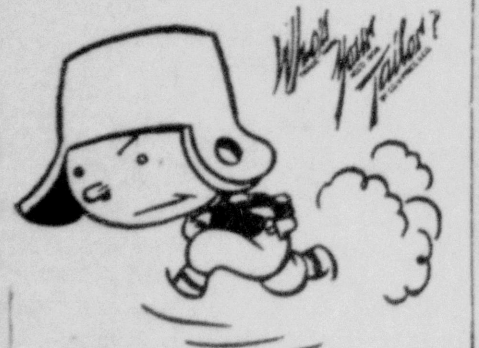
The initial term issue of "The Interscholastic Leaguer," official organ of the department, is being printed and will be mailed out before the end of the week to 12,000 Texas teachers.

The Interscholastic League State Executive Committee, appointed by the president to serve the 1925-26 session, is as follows:

Thomas H. Shelby, chairman; Roy Bedichek, W. A. Felsing, Roy B. Henderson, R. A. Cox, B. C. Tharp, H. P. Bybee, R. A. Law and I. L. Nelson. Felsing, Cox, and Tharp are new members. Reports have been filed from 40 counties of local officers elected to conduct county league contests. More than 220 counties organized for membership in the league last year.

**Football Still Onen**  
Roy B. Henderson, athletic director for Interscholastic League, stated that the state football championship contest would be open to entries until October 1. To date more than 250 schools have complied with the terms of membership. No school may sign until it has accepted the plan worked out by the league officials for determining the state champion consisting of a code, a division of the state into sections, and 16 rules of procedure and conduct to be observed in contest relations.
