A few days ago, a long-forgotten generic name among the Ostreidee was unearthed here accidentally. It is Saccostres Dollfus & Dantzenberg, 1920, Conchyliologie du Miccene Moyen du Bassin de la Loire, pt. 1: Pelecypodes (Suite et fin): Soc. Geol. France Mem., No. 27, Paleontologie V. 22, pts. 2-4, p. 379-500, pl. 34-51 [see p. 471]. Type species by monotypy: Catres (Saccostres) saccellus Dujardin. As far as I can gather from the literature, it seems to have been overlooked by everytody including Neave and myself. Miss Marcia A. Edwards of the Zoological Record has been notified.

The work on the Ostreidee is progressing very slowly. There is too much incidental literature, too many important observations hidden in obscure papers, too many unrelated facts to coordinate, and no good library in Houston.
