Bob Eckhardt is the best cartoonist that school ever had. Go up in that architectural de-partment and drag out some-body else other than Chris Maiwald. Invite original contributions. Go to the library and read a couple of books, You might get a few ideas. Call up Ruth Shirley; she's clever. 



I extracted the cork from the third bottle, emptied the good ol' booze down the bottle, except a glass, which I drank.


I pulled the cork from the fourth sink and poured the bottle down the glass when I drank some.




