VARSITY QUEEN IS CROWNED BEFORE LARGE AUDIENCE

University Student Believed Drowned

NO TRACE FOUND OF MCURDY SINCE ACCIDENT HAPPENED

Mildred Morris Also in Canoe,
Escaped by Swimming
Ashore

Albert McCurdy, twenty-year old University student is reported drowned as a result of the capsizing of his canoe early last night at the mouth of Bull Creek near Steve's Place on the scenic drive. Mildred Morris, who was with him in the canoe escaped by swimming and floating to shore on the Austin side.

According to her story, she wandered through the woods around Mount Bonnell for about two hours before she finally found the road to town. She had seen nothing of McCurdy since the canoe capsized. As soon as she reached town with the news, a searching party was organized by Mr. Walter E. Long, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of discovering the body.

It is possible that McCurdy swam across to the opposite side and has been unable to notify his friends of his whereabouts.

At 1 o'clock Friday morning, further details of the accident were unknown. As McCurdy was known to be a good swimmer, there is a possibility that he escaped but has been unable to communicate with his friends.

McCurdy's home is in San Antonio. He has been a student of the University for the past several years, but for the past term had been attending the Austin Theological Presbyterian Seminary. Miss Morris is a member of Alpha Phi fraternity. She is a senior in the University.

It's do or die for Texas University this afternoon at College Station when they clash with the Texas Aggies in the first of a two game series.

Texas still has a forlorn chance to accomplish the near impossible, and breeze home the champions in the twelfth conference baseball race. This afternoon and Saturday they will be confronted with the supreme test of taking the Aggies to a double cleaning and returning home for their four game series with Baylor with a shot at the title. The Aggies beat the Longhorns two games on Clark Field early in the season, and appeared a much stronger ball club, but the Farmers were playing way above their head as the result of the play since has clearly indicated.

Texas Fights on Kyle Field
Although the Aggies fight harder on Kyle Field than any other place in the world, the Longhorns are known to outfight the Farmers in baseball on their sacred field ever since Billy Ditch came to Texas. Last year Texas won both of their games from the Farmers on Kyle Field, and so on back the Steers have always furnished the toughest of opposition at College Station.

The Texas team is in shape, and after their miserable slump in fielding and hitting in the last game with S. M. U. should have many hits in their war clubs and few, if any errors, in their service worn gloves.

Leissner to Hurl
Captain Ferdinand Leissner, the star of the Texas staff, will hurl this afternoon for Texas. And if there is one more victory left in that old right arm of his, he will squeeze it out this afternoon. With the scrapping Texas captain on the hill, the Steers will fight their heads off to win for him—and that's saying a lot.

On the other hand, Lefty Rogers, who stood Texas on their beans in Austin several weeks ago will likely draw the Aggie hurling assignment. If Rogers does not hurl, then Pat Olsen, big Farmer right hander, will be on the mound.

A loss in either of the games with the Aggies will just about ruin the Texas' title hopes.

The game will be given out by radio at the Co-Op play by play starting at 4 o'clock.

Butte Refuses to Become Candidate for Varsity Prexy

After a three month's absence from the State, Dean George C. Butte has returned to Austin. He has just learned of the situation in regard to the presidency of the University. In an open letter to the Board of Regents, Dean Butte says: "Having just returned from a three months' absence from the State, I have learned the situation with regard to the Presidency of the University. Some partial friends without my knowledge have asked you to elect me. Without wishing to appear presumptuous, may I ask you please not to consider my name for that office: I accepted the Deanship of the Law School with but one purpose: to help make it the peer of any Law School in the United States. In that ambition I sincerely bespeak your earnest co-operation."

BALL AND RECEPTION IN HONOR OF QUEEN AND COURT HELD THURSDAY

VARSITY HISTORY TO BE REVIEWED ON CLARK FIELD

Many Campus Organizations
Will Be Represented in
Long Parade

Varsity's big parade and the magnificent pageant are the two most important features of the Fortieth Anniversary Celebration for Friday. Outstanding in the list of events planned for the three day celebration of the fortieth anniversary of the establishment of the University is the historical pageant, which is to take place on Clark Field at 7:15 Friday evening. The spectacle will be presented under the direction of Dr. Milton R. Gutsch; beginning with the early history of Texas, the pageant will portray how the University idea came into existence, how and by whom the University of Texas was established, and how it grew from a small college to its present size and rank.

Pageant in Three Sections
The entire pageant will be divided into three main sections. The first of these will be historical prologue and will be the most elaborate in presentation and costuming. The second part is to portray the evolution of the University. It will consist of slides, tableaux, music, statues, symbolical dances, and stunts by the cowboys. The eight musical organizations will appear at intervals and enliven the program by performances between episodes.

Vinson Will Speak
Concluding the pageant, Governor Neff will speak on the University and the State. President Vinson will then deliver an address on "The University of the Future." A perspective will then be thrown on the screen showing the new University as it will appear when the building program has been completed and the shacks have all disappeared. After this Charles Endress will publicly call for bids for the construction of the new biology building.

Parade of Five Sections
The parade, which will consist of five sections, will start at 2:30. The first section is to be led by Governor Neff and President Vinson and will be made up of University, state and city officials; officers of the ex-students association and student officers. The section will contain the Queen of Varsity and her court, surrounded by the University National Guard Company, marching as an escort of honor with fixed bayonets. Floats prepared by sororities, fraternities, clubs and other University organizations will form the third section. The fourth section will be made up entirely of comic floats and burlesques entered by various University organizations. Educational floats showing the work and collections of the various departments of the University will make up the fifth and last section. Interspersed with the sections will be the Longhorn Band, the Glée Club, the Shrine Club, the American Legion and other University clubs.

Opening Social Festivity of Celebration Characterized by Mediaeval Times

An atmosphere of mediaeval chivalry pervaded the campus Thursday evening when the Fortieth Anniversary Celebration festivities were opened at 10 o'clock with a ball and reception at the Woman's Gymnasium and Woman's Building, in honor of Queen Maria of the House of Taylor, and her Royal Court.

Reception for Queen and Court
Immediately after the coronation, the Queen and her court proceeded to the Woman's Building, entering by an ancient draw-bridge and were received in the left drawing room by Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Vinson, Miss Lucy Newton, Messrs. and Mesdames Walter Fisher, G. N. Dilworth, Malcolm Reed, Pierre Bremford, Haskell Caswell, Ewell Nalle, M. C. Parrish, A. W. Griffith, D. D. Fairchild, Jud James, E. B. Gilliam, Albert Burleson and Mesdames M. C. White, Fay Watkins, J. O. Creighton and R. C. Brackenridge, patrons and patronesses of the Ball. This room as well as the dining room which was cleared for dancing, was decorated in palms and ferns. In the dining room Cholly's Tocadores furnished the music.

After the Reception the Queen and the Royal Party made entry into the Woman's Gymnasium which was decorated to represent the interior of a mediaeval castle. High gray stone walls were hung with battle axes, spears, shields, and armorial bearings. The idea was further carried out in the small Gothic windows, the mediaeval banners which hung from the ceiling, and the low-slung torches from ceiling and walls. Two high flood lights were also used.

From a balcony the chaperones, Misses Lucy Newton, Edna McDaniel, Gertrude Wroe, and Mesdames John Robbins, M. Muckleroy, A. P. Peirce and Dan Bellows overlooked the scene of modern chivalry.

Formal Opening of Ball

The Ball was formally opened by Ye Grande Promenade led by Her Majesty, Queen Maria, honoring King John of the House of Bullington. Other dances on the programs which were scrolls written in Old English sealed with a golden seal, followed the mediaeval scheme by honoring some hero or event of the days of chivalry, such as "To Richard Coeur de Lion of fondeste memorie," "To those Sturdy Englishe Crusaders who sleepe in heathen londes." "In Membrane of ye valiant stande of ye Scottishe Knights at Runnymede." The fourth dance was the cotillion which was led by Bob Murphree, honoring Mary Glynn Vick of Fort Worth. There were no favors.

Tea Garden

Between dances couples repaired to a tea garden between the Woman's Gymnasium and Woman's Building, where French bulb lanterns gave a soft glow, and table and chairs were scattered through out. Here soda pop and ice cream were sold, and an extra attraction was a roulette wheel.

During the intermission a negro quartet, gave several selections which was designated on the programs as "Ye Oldene Balalades of many a Londe, Sung by a bande of wandering Saracen Bards." Dancing continued until 3 o'clock and the Ball ended with a dance entitled "All Hail Our Beautious Queene."

Music for the occasion was furnished by Vaughan's Virginians of Danville, Virginia.

VINSON DECLARES FORMAL OPENING OF CELEBRATION

Addresses by Neff, Taylor and
Bailey Feature Campus
Gathering

TRIBUTE PAID VARSITY

Importance of University Education Stressed by All Speakers

Before a large crowd which gathered on the campus in front of the Women's Building Thursday afternoon, at 2:30 p. m., President Robert E. Vinson of the University of Texas declared the Fortieth Anniversary Celebration to be formally opened. He was preceded on the program by Dean T. U. Taylor, who spoke on the glorious past of the University and the men responsible for its growth and B. P. Bailey of the class of 1883, who spoke on the duties of the present student in the eyes of an old student. Governor Pat M. Neff, spoke on the relations of the University and the State as a whole. Archie Gray, President of the Students' Association, presided at the meeting.

Neff's Speech
Governor Neff declared that "the University belongs not to the State itself but to the five million citizens of the State, and its influence should be carried to every nook and corner of the State. It is not so much to what the University ought to be, but it is to what has been done that I lift my hat in undying gratitude." He pleaded for better cooperation between the ex-students and the students of the University, claiming his right and duty to stand on the same platform with President Vinson, and extending to the many visitors and ex-students, a welcome to the big birthday party of old Varsity.

Dr. Vinson Talks

"If one human life can have such a tremendous reach, how rich the State is in having an institution who sends out so many with degrees" said Dr. Vinson in declaring the celebration opened. "81,000 names have been written on the roles of the University. A majority of these have come from Texas homes, and were sent to the University of Texas, to become citizens of the state of Texas. More than any other university in America, Texas has been a home University, filled with its own children, sending them back to its own homes. In this day of evil, the spirit of the University is as free, as forward looking, as unconquered, as the day when it began its mission in this commonwealth of America, and so it is that we are gathered here to dedicate our lives to another forty years for our Alma Mater."

Dean Taylor aid a glowing tribute to the great men who have touched the life of the University and, through it, the life of the State. "Although few know it," he continued, "another man has touched the life of the University and the State of Texas. The anthem we sing with uncovered heads traces back to the great Christian captain who rode old Traveler up and down the battle fields of Virginia, and who spoke to the students of his own University, Washington and Lee, with the words, 'the eyes of the South are upon you.' His words were paraphrased by one of his audience, William Prather, who later became president of the University of Texas, who told the Texas students that 'the Eyes of Texas are upon you.'"

Class of '83 Represented

Mr. Bailey bemoaned the fact that no University whose students were trained in shacks could be a university of the first class. "It is the absolute duty of the Legislature to provide amply for the needs of this school, a trust left them by those who founded the University," he said.

Coronation Celebrated With Great Pomp and Splendor

With all the pomp and splendor befitting the coronation of the Queen of the Court of Jewels, Her Majesty, Queen of the University, Maria of the House of Taylor was crowned by High Priest Archie Gray. Knights and Ladies, Dukes and Duchesses, pages and dancers heralded and entertained Her Majesty and His Majesty, John, of the House of Bullington, Thursday at 7:30 in the Men's Gymnasium.

The approach of the Queen was preceded by her duchesses announced by the Lord High Chancellor James Hart Jr. Lady Lynette of the House of Onstott, Duchess of Tutquiose, and her Duke George Kemble, were attended by the Maid of Honor, Miss Katherine Terrell and Esquire Walter Raleigh Smith.

Lady Josephine of the House of Gilliam, Duchess of Aquamarine, and her Duke Cameron Fairchild were attended by the Maid of Honor, Miss Blossom Lusk and Esquire Monroe McConnell, Lady Gladys of the House of Dublin, Duchess of Amethyst, and Duke Jack Harper were attended by the Maid of Honor Anita Thorogood and Esquire William McPhail. Lady Minired of the House of Smith, Duchess of Sapphire Rose and Duke Jack Furman were attended by the Maid of Honor Dolores Dore and Esquire Benjamin Brown. Lady Ruth of the House of Ratliff, Duchess of Jade, and Duke Bob Lyles, were attended by the Maid of Honor, Patti Bailey and Esquire Bert Crowell, Lady Dorothy of the House of Brown, Duchess of Topaz and Duke Lovell Turner were attended by the Maid of Honor, Margaret Miller and Esquire Albert Prater. Lady Thula of the House of Hardie, Duchess of Coral, and Duke Harold Stannard were attended by the Maid of Honor, Miss Minnie Bickett and Esquire James Wiseman. Lady Eleanor of the House of Seastrunk, Duchess of Sapphire, and Duke Burt Dyke were attended by the Maid of Honor, Elizabeth Thrasher and Esquire Edward Arnim.

Her Majesty's attendants were announced next by the Lord High Chancellor James Hart. The ladies were met at the base of the royal throne by their knights. The approach led from the door of the Coronation Hall by an elevated platform, carrying out the color scheme of royal blue and gold. A large crescent-shaped platform with gold steps leading to the throne furnished an elaborate stage for the coronation. Lady Jeannette of the House of Young, Maid of Honor to the Queen, and Sir Arthur Nalle, Lady Miriam of the House of Milburn and Sir Frank Newton, Lady Onah of the House of Astin and Sir Seth Barwise, Lady Virginia of the House of Sledge and Sir Edward Newberry, Lady Esther of the House of Watkins and Sir Walter Lee Newsome, Lady Helen of the House of Rulfs and Sir Jack Howell, and Lady Anna of the House of Caswell and Sir Kenneth Caswell formed a semi-circle around the throne, and Her Majesty, Queen of the University, Maria of the House of Taylor was announced. The Queen's crown was studded with precious jewels and carried out the scheme of the Court of Jewels. Her gown was ivory satin with an elaborate court train jeweled appropriately.

The University Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Prof. F. L. Reed and an orchestra directed by Burnett Pharr had charge of the music for the marches and dancing. The Ladies and their Maids were gowned in jeweled robes in colors and accessories corresponding to their jewels.

**ASSEMBLY WILL
DECIDE CASE OF
DEAN VS. GAMBILL**
Consideration of the eligibility of Gambill and Dean will be taken up at a special meeting of the Students' Assembly called by Archie Gray Friday at 5 o'clock in the assembly room. If both the candidates are declared eligible, the assembly will have to call a new election as an official recount of votes showed that Dean and Gambill each had received 738 votes. A new election will have to be called also if both men are disqualified, because there is a provision in the handbook which states that if the two leading candidates are disqualified, a new election must be held.

The new election that will be held to break the tie in case both men are found eligible will be merely a decision of the assembly as there is no provision in the handbook to cover a tie. As soon as the assembly's decision upon the eligibility of the two candidates has been given, the question of a new election will be put before them. If a new election is called, it will be for an early date, probably Tuesday, May 15.

EXPOSITION HALLS OPEN TO VISITORS AT TEN O'CLOCK

Many Departments of University Are Represented in Displays

Doors to the various exhibitions on the campus will be thrown open at 10 o'clock this morning for the benefit of visitors.

Geologic exhibits are to be on the third floor of the Main Building and in Q Hall. Other exhibits in the Main Building, will be that of the Greek statuary on the fourth floor, the forestry collection in the rotunda of the third floor as will be the botany exhibit, and the zoology collection in room 320.

Displays of work in Home Economics will be shown in H Hall 6, and anthropology exhibits in rooms 206-208 of the Education Building. War posters will be posted in rooms 203-205.

Architecture students will display their work on the second floor of the Engineering Building, and the mechanical and civil engineers will have the pattern shop, power building, and engineering buildings open. Scenery from all over Texas will be shown at the Texas Theatre at 11 o'clock this morning.

Both the Garcia and Wrenn libraries will be open to the public, and signatures of famous men will be shown by Mrs. Hatcher who is in charge of visitors to the library. African relics will be displayed in the Y. W. C. A. headquarters by the Y. M. C. A. in addition to the posters and placards to be shown there. In addition a rest room has been provided for visitors in the Girls' Study Hall.

Editorials

PUTTING OVER THE CELEBRATION

With the holding of the first events of the Fortieth Anniversary program, it is evident that the affair is, and will be, a complete success, and one of the worthwhile accomplishments of the student body.

Apparently the anniversary of "Varsity's birthday" is going over smoothly and in a big fashion. When the present student body is replaced by another generation of students, the celebration now being held will be remembered as the one big accomplishment of 1923. And because the celebration is working out successfully, and because of the smoothness with which the program is expected to be carried out, the less thought will be given by the general student body to the work, trouble and care which has been necessary to make the celebration a success.

As the students, ex-students and faculty enjoy the various features of the program, it is safe to say that few will give thought to the months of work, the neglected studies, and painful calculation, and the detailed effort to overcome obstacles which has characterized the work of the committee in charge of the celebration. With steadfast belief in the ability of University students to accomplish something out of the ordinary, the leaders of the celebration committee have presented to the University and the student body a "birthday party" that many predicted would fail, and few would have dared to attempt. These students, and the many others who have carried out the endless detailed tasks necessary for the success of such an affair, deserve, and should receive, the greatest praise and appreciation from the student body.

THE UNDERGRADUATE SPIRIT

While the Fortieth Anniversary Celebration will go down in campus history as a great accomplishment of the student body, it should be remembered that a considerable part of the success of the celebration has been due to the work and efforts of a few faculty members.

The celebration is a student affair. It was conceived and worked out by students, and should receive its proper place in campus history as a student enterprise. The faculty members who have assisted in the work expect, and will receive, little credit for that which they have accomplished, and the part which they have played in the celebration. Yet, of all the people connected with the anniversary, they perhaps deserve the greatest praise—for they have been able to drop their faculty dignity and viewpoint in assisting with and putting over a purely student enterprise. While these men are long past their undergraduate days, they still have with them that undergraduate spirit of loyalty and service toward the school. They have that most

appreciated and valuable thing, from the viewpoint of the student—a real interest in and understanding of students, and a desire to serve the University. While these faculty members will receive little of the public acclaim for the celebration, a probably far greater reward will be theirs in the knowledge that they have that thing which so few teachers can boast—the friendship and admiration of their students, and at the same time, their respect.

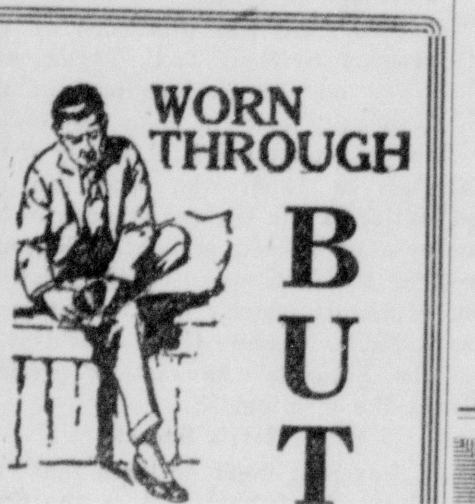
