When persons are convicted of so-called victimless crime—drug charges or tax evasion, for example—they are often sentenced to federal minimum security institutions. The majority of these men and women are parents of minor children. Their removal from their parental roles is a disruption from which families might never recover. A project which is only the second in any federal prison, and the first to involve fathers, operates at a facility in Fort Worth, Texas. PACT—Parents and Children Together—works to promote good relationships between parents and children and provides a special family place where they can be together. Enclosed is *A Child Serving Time on the Outside*, the story of that program and its Hogg-funded component, Support for Kids of Incarcerated Parents.

*The View from an International Nongovernmental Organization*



A member of the Foundation's National Advisory Council, Dr. Eugene B. Brody, was invited to be the first speaker at a Global Issues Forum at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas. As former president and current secretary-general of the World Federation for Mental Health, he is uniquely well qualified to speak on mental health and world citizenship, a major theme of the World Federation since its inception. The text of his address has been reprinted as a Foundation pamphlet titled *Mental Health and World Citizenship: The View from an International Nongovernmental Organization*. It is included in this mailing.



## Hogg advisors: National C

When the Hogg Foundation's Executive Committee meets late this spring in semiannual review of current programming, discussions of areas of unmet need, and examination of timeliness of objectives, that group will benefit from the advice and consultation of several prominent specialists in the social sciences and philanthropy.

Members of the Foundation's National Advisory Council, a three-member group appointed for rotating three-year terms, meet twice a year with Hogg executive officers and a committee from the faculty of The University of Texas at Austin in discussions of program trends and deliberations on long-range planning. The Faculty Advisory Committee is also made up of three members appointed for staggered three-year terms.

Current members of the National Advisory Council are Eugene B. Brody, Martin A. Paley, and Alice S. Rossi. Consultants from the University faculty are Elspeth Davies Rostow, Janet T. Spence, and Louis A. Zurcher.

Eugene B. Brody, M.D., is Secretary General of the World Federation for Mental Health, Professor of Psychiatry and Human Behavior at the University of Maryland, and Senior Associate at Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health. He is Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of Nervous*

*and Mental Disease* and serves on the Editorial Board of the *American Journal of Social Psychiatry*. Dr. Brody was on faculty at Yale University School of Medicine and has held numbers of visiting professorships and lectureships in addition to his consultation work with national and international health and mental health groups.

Martin A. Paley brings to the Advisory Council years of experience and knowledge acquired in the world of philanthropy and charitable giving. He was Director of the San Francisco Foundation, the country's largest community foundation, from 1975 through 1986. He has been a participant in national philanthropic organizations, serving on boards of the Independent Sector and the Council on Foundations. He is currently consulting on special problems for local groups and national organizations and working with other foundations on regional planning in the San Francisco Bay area.

Alice S. Rossi is Harriet Martineau Professor of Sociology at the University of Massachusetts. Earlier teaching appointments were at the University of Chicago and at Goucher College. She has served as President of the American Sociological Association and chair of the Board of Directors of the Social Science Research Council. She was a founder and member of the governing board of the National Organization for Women. Dr. Rossi received a Presidential appointment to direct the National Commission for the Observance of International Women's Year. Her most recent book, *Gender and the Life Course* (Aldine Publishing, 1985), is one of the ASA Presidential Series.

Elspeth D. Rostow brings a wide background in the social sciences, higher education, and public administration to her appointment as Stiles Professor in the

University's American Studies Program. Her most recent administrative post was as Dean of the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs. She has also been Acting Director of American Studies, Chair of Comparative Studies, and Dean of the Division of General and Comparative Studies. Lecture-ships have taken Professor Rostow around the world and across the nation, and she has served on faculties of Barnard College, Sarah Lawrence College, Cambridge University, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Janet T. Spence is Ashbel Smith Professor of Psychology. Before joining the University of Texas faculty in 1965, she held teaching appointments at Northwestern and Harvard universities. She also held a major appointment at Research Psychologist with the Veterans Administration Hospital in Iowa City. She is noted for research on masculinity and femininity and has worked with another University professor to measure attitudes toward women in contemporary society. Dr. Spence has served as President of the American Psychological Association and was Chair of the University's Psychology Department 1968 to 1972.

The most recent addition to the Faculty Advisory Committee is Louis A. Zurcher, Ashbel Smith Professor of Social Work and Sociology. Previous teaching positions have been at the University of Arizona and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. At the latter, he was Associate Provost and Dean of the Graduate School. Concur-

rent with his University of Texas affiliation, Dr. Zurcher has also held adjunct appointments at Antioch Union, Pepperdine, and Western Behavioral Science Institute. He currently serves as Editor of the book series *Contemporary Studies in Applied Behavioral Science* and *The Journal of Applied Behavioral Science*. He was the 1985 recipient of the Lora Lee Pederson Teaching Excellence Awards.

The contributions of present and past National Advisory Council members and Faculty Advisors have been invaluable to the Hogg Foundation staff and to the people of Texas, the ultimate beneficiaries. We are indebted to these men and women who have given so generously of their time and expertise. The Hogg Foundation takes this opportunity to extend sincere thanks.
