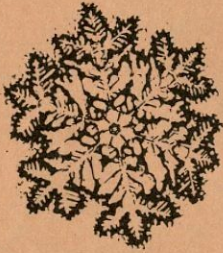

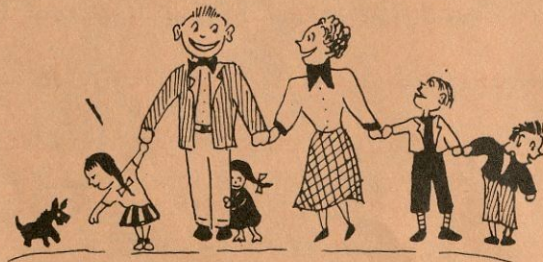


EXPERIMENT IN LIVING by Dorothy Schloss, who is coordinator at Terrell State Hospital, describes what happens to a hospital ward when professional designers decide to make an attractive, home-like environment; in other words, to undertake an experiment or investment in living. The ward selected was not an old one, where any change could have brought credit to the changers. Rather, the National Society of Interior Designers who planned this assignment selected a renovated, dormitory-like ward and attempted to find out if providing a warm, live environment which was home like and comfortable might actually improve the condition of the patients on the ward.

How well they succeeded can be learned by reading the booklet.

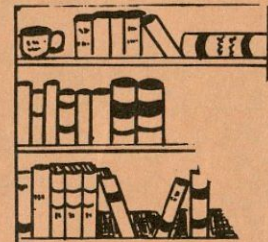
