1- Modern Beluchistan, 6'l" by 4'3", \$57.50. Practically new condition. Colors- chiefly deep wine or marcon, black; miner amounts of white and dark blue. Possibly you will remember this rug; you commented that you were interested in it when you were

2- Modern Shirvan or Kuba, 4'9" by 3'3", \$25.00. Very good condition except about 6" cut in one end which has been well repaired. Colors- chiefly dark blue and red, with considerable pale yellow and white.

4- Antique Beluchistan, 4'11" by 3'1", \$9.00. Fair condition only, shows considerable wear, but edges are good and there are no holes. Colors- red, white, blue and black. (Note these dimensions do not include the webs at the ends - actually this piece is probably at least 8" longer than the dimensions given.)

All of these rugs have geometrical patterns rather than floral patterns. The colfors are rich rather than bright. If you will give me some idea of what you want, it is possible I could find it for you. However, I doubt if I can find much of anything at prices comparable to those for the three just described.
