Hogg Foundation Moves to New Quarters

After 27 years of occupying two floors of the Main Building on The University of Texas Campus at Austin, The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health moved in January to the Will C. Hogg Building, formerly the Geology Building.

Dedication of this building will take place in official ceremonies on June 8. The Foundation occupies the third and a portion of the fourth floor, while Computer Sciences and Zoology are housed in the remainder of the structure.

Included in the Foundation's expanded quarters are: on the third floor, staff offices, conference room, consultants' offices, the Hogg Foundation Library (which contains a specialized collection of material in the area of mental health) and the Regional Foundation Library (a depository for the Foundation Library Center of New York). A publications distribution office, mailing room, and the archives are located on the fourth floor.

What Is Mental Health?

That someone is Dr. Moody C. Bettis, associate director of the Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences in Houston, Texas. Psychiatrist Talks of Married Women

The Married Woman . . . Her Most Important Relationship is the subject of discussion by Dr. Eugene C. McDanald, Jr., psychiatrist at The University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

How the normal woman effects movements *with, away from, and against* her husband, her children, and herself is examined in the booklet enclosed with this mailing. Such movements made by the neurotic woman are also investigated by Dr. McDanald.

Director, Two Assistants Travel to Nassau, Washington

Among the 50 women honored in April at the White House at the third in a series of Women Doers luncheons given by Mrs. Lyndon Johnson were Dr. Bernice Milburn Moore, assistant to the director for community programs, and Bert Kruger Smith, assistant to the director for mental health education.

Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Hubert Humphrey greeted guests and Mrs. Humphrey participated in a panel which discussed, "What Citizens Can do to Improve the Health of the American Child."

The Delta Kappa Gamma Society has printed copies of the talk given by Bert Kruger Smith, before a citywide group of members. The Hogg Foundation has purchased reprints for distribution to its mailing list.

Children with special needs—those culturally deprived, emotionally disturbed, retarded, or suffering from learning disabilities are described. Additional copies are available.

The pamphlet grew from talks Dr. McDanald made before chaplains of the United States Air Force, who came to The University of Texas at Austin campus twice a year under the auspices of The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health.

Dr. Bernice M. Moore, who was co-director of the seminars, has written the introduction to this booklet. Additional copies are available for 25c each.

World Federation for Mental Health to Convene in London

"Keys to Progress-Mental Health Education" will be the theme of the 7th International Congress on Mental Health, according to Professor G. M. Carstairs, president of the World Federation.

Attendance at these sessions is open to professional workers in psychiatry, psychology, education, nursing, social work, public health administration, and allied fields; and to non-professional people interested in the promotion of mental health and the improvement of human relations throughout the world.

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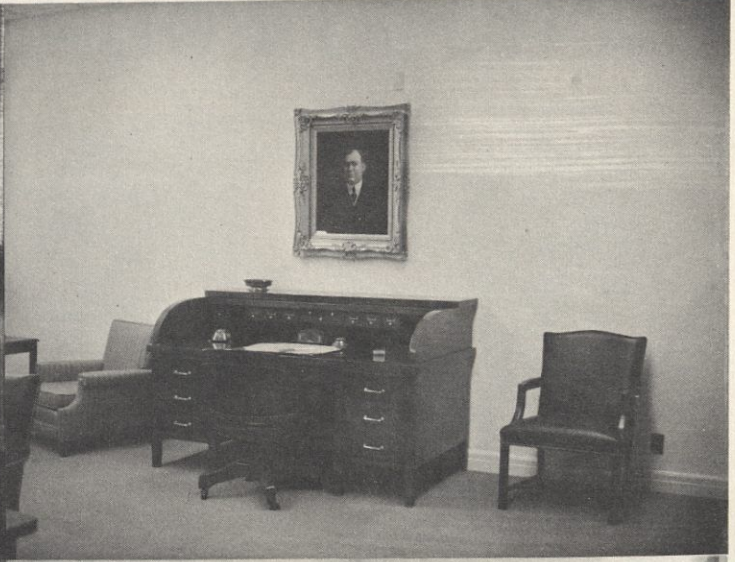
