Dear Dr. Stenzel:


In connection with the abstract of the paper to be presented by yourself in collaboration with E.K. Krause and J.T. Twining the readers for the Palaeontology section have forwarded to me some suggestions for a revision of the abstract. As you may know the G.S.A. has been trying for the past few meetings to standardise abstracts and to require that they should represent as complete a summary of the conclusions reached as is possible within the limit of space.

They suggest that you should indicate how many species and genera, new and old, and how many fewer species there are than in the Cook Mountain fauna. In general they suggest that it should be revised "with an eye to greater specificity".

Not being a Palaeontologist I cannot offer any comments one way or the other myself. I know what a nuisance it is to get abstracts to fit every society's requirements but I hope you will be good enough to cooperate in this matter.
