 - a. Tobacco-free Campus – Adrienne Howarth-Moore, Director of Human Resource Services
 - i. Wanted to talk informally based on some of the comments we have been receiving based on the announcement we made on our updated tobacco policy, made effective April 9th, which was when the date of the signature became effective. Some of the comments we have received have been around the location where we have made tobacco locations. One of the primary questions we have received is why there are no temporary smoking areas in central campus around the science building. There is a statute requirement within the cancer research center that there is no smoking anywhere near secret research funding is taking place. We were not able to put those temporary tobacco locations in those areas because of that statute. We didn't want to put them in between dark buildings so that tobacco users will be safe. We wanted to use areas that had existing seating and shade trees. We did not choose to construct awnings or structures because they were temporary. I am open for questions
 - ii. Spiller: Any other talks around other substance regulation?
 - iii. Howarth-Moore: Not that I am aware of
 - iv. Pickei: How will it be enforced?
 - v. Howarth-Moore: Well not a whole lot of people are aware of a current law that says that you cannot smoke within 20 feet of an entrance to a building, and yet there are spots on campus with ashtrays in those areas. We will be removing ashtrays in areas that are not reserved smoking areas. We are trying to create a campus culture, it is a public health issue on top of a use of cancer funding
 - b. Mindful Eating Program – Sara Weber, Licensed Professional Counselor of the UT Counseling and Mental Health Center
 - i. Louis is passing around candy, don't eat it
 - ii. I am kind of a mover, so I will try myself to stand still
 - iii. I have 15 minutes to tell you about something that usually takes 3 hours
 - iv. I wanted to make this interactive, bear with me and be as involved with me as possible.



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- xv. The number one contributing factor to developing an eating disorder is dieting. It is not just about food and weight; it is almost impossible to treat alone, it can happen to anyone, deadliest psychiatric disorder.
- xvi. 80 percent of students in a cohort of 1000 have dieted or skipped meals, and 20 percent of students said they have an eating disorder, if you do the math for 50,000 students that is a lot of people, and 75 percent did not seek treatment. One of the things that I wanted to bring to you is ways to address those issues.
- xvii. Number one is don't diet. If you don't know how to do that, come to me. You will likely be less healthy, more heavy, less happy
- xviii. Stop the fat talk. Don't insult others or yourself
- xix. Dieting isn't smart, stop. There are other ways to do it. Anyone can recover from eating disorders, it's not something you are going to get caught in but you need to get help. Consider the way you talk about eating disorders, status quo. Challenge the status quo, thin/buff ideals.
- xx. There is a resource list of books and websites that I think are worth looking at. There are flyers and cards in the back.

n. City Relations Agency Director – Jenna Milani

i. Lund: Jenna is a second year History major and has experience working on different issues pertinent to the greater Austin community. We are confident in her ability to encourage students to be involved and aware of city issues. I will let Jenna tell you more about herself.

ii. Evans: I am Daniel Evans, I apologize for confusing the process, thank you for the time, I am the current city relations director, I dropped by tonight to see what was going on with the process, saw the external appointments, and kind of ran across John Lawler in the back and found out that he didn't get it. I haven't been in conversation with Thor or the new administration and I didn't provide any sort of recommendation. When I came in to SG this was a new positions, John was the point person, he has been involved in so many issues from single member districts to parking meters to the contraflow bike lanes. He knows city council members, he has connections, he has been on UAP, is their appointment to CANPAC, which I also sit on, he would probably be the best person that you could appoint to city relations agency, he understands them far better than I do, I don't want to take anything away from whoever is up for appointment, a great person probably had great qualities, if we want to appoint the best person possible it would be John, I can't imagine a better person for this job, don't want to throw a kink in the process?

- xi. Briley: It really is, I am interested in recruitment and retention at this university, the top 8 percent rule affects a lot of people, we can work to get something done and work to get students to support UT in Fisher v. UT.
- xii. Roberts: Are they grandfathering that rule out right now?
- xiii. Lund: It is being looked into now, it stems from the Board of Regents
- xiv. Roberts: So you would push to kind of forward that in that direction?
- xv. Williams: Point of Information? There is really no top 8 percent rule, there is a bill in the house that only allows 75 percent of the incoming class to be part of the top 10 percent automatic admission
- xvi. Patel: What type of volunteer service have you done within and throughout both the university and outside?
- xvii. Briley: We bring in students every week and provide them with resources and encourage them to apply and attend UT, we talk to students who don't know if they want to come or don't think they can afford it, I work with those students to help them make the decision

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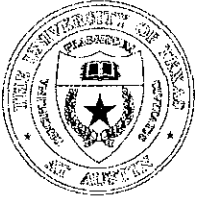
