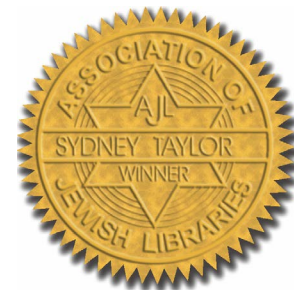


2016 Sydney Taylor Book Awards Announcement

Lesléa Newman and Amy June Bates, author and illustrator of *Ketzel, the Cat who Composed*, Aharon Appelfeld, Philippe Dumas and Jeffrey M. Green, author, illustrator and translator of *Adam and Thomas*, and Laura Amy Schlitz, author of *The Hired Girl*, are the 2016 winners of the Sydney Taylor Book Award.

The Sydney Taylor Book Award honors new books for children and teens that exemplify the highest literary standards while authentically portraying the Jewish experience. The award memorializes Sydney Taylor, author of the classic All-of-a-Kind Family series. The winners will receive their awards at the Association of Jewish Libraries Conference in Charleston, South Carolina this June.

Newman and Bates will receive the 2016 gold medal in the Sydney Taylor Book Award's Younger Reader category for *Ketzel, the Cat Who Composed*, published by Candlewick Press. This delightful picture book tells the true story of musician Morris Moshe Cotel, whose cat helped him compose a one-minute composition that received an honorable mention in the Paris New Music Review competition. The illustrations are heartwarming and add much charm to the story. Appelfeld, Dumas and Green will receive the 2016 gold medal in the Sydney Taylor Book Award's Older Readers category for *Adam and Thomas*, published by Seven Stories Press. This sweet story tells of two nine-year-old Jewish boys who survive the last winter of World War II, helping each other so that one grows physically stronger and braver and the other grows spiritually. Laura Amy Schlitz will receive the 2016 gold medal in the Sydney Taylor Book Award's Teen category for *The Hired Girl*, published by Candlewick Press. This sensitive story tells how fourteen-year-old Catholic Joan Skraggs becomes a hired girl to a Jewish family where she learns and grows in unexpected ways.

Five Sydney Taylor Honor Books were named for 2016. For Younger Readers, the Honor Books are *Everybody Says Shalom*, written by Leslie Kimmelman and illustrated by Talitha Shipman, published by Random House, and *Shanghai Sukkah*, written by Heidi Smith Hyde and illustrated by Jing Jing Tsong, published by Kar-Ben Publishing. *Hereville: How Mirka Caught a Fish* by Barry Deutsch, published by Amulet Books, is the Honor book in the Older Reader category. For Teen Readers, the Honor books are *Serendipity's Footsteps* by Suzanne Nelson, published by Alfred A. Knopf, a division of Random House, and *Stones on a Grave* by Kathy Kacer, published by Orca Book Publishers.

President's Corner

Dear AJL members,

As some of you may know, the AJL Board convened for a mid-winter phone conference on Sunday, January 17, 2016 to review our accomplishments since the last conference, discuss more ways to sustain and grow our Association, and outline some motions for your consideration and approval.

In some semi-annual reports sent in by Council members, we read about the amazing work that our volunteers are doing on behalf of all of us. Thank you!

I would like to share with you some good news about our fiscal situation reflected in our year-to-date budget submitted by our Treasurer, Kathy Bloch: thanks to a variety of fundraising efforts, from Jackie Ben Efraim's tripling (!) of our program ads' revenue, to donations to our Jubilee Fund, and a generous bequest from Judy Cohn's Z"l estate, we have ended the fiscal year in the green. Our bank balance (Operations & Savings accounts) stands at \$243,595.00. Getting to this point has been one of my strongest motivations for joining the Board and running for the President's position, and I am grateful to all who contributed hard work AND money to get us there.

At our meeting we approved the creation of "The Judy Cohn Conference Stipend Fund" to supplement the Association's own budget allocations for the same purpose. As such, this new fund would be added to the list of solicited donations promoted by AJL. A special link would be posted on our web site to direct such earmarked donations to the fund.

In the Development front, I am happy to announce that as of January 15, 2016, we have engaged the services of Elevate, a DC based fund raising company, to help us write grants and create an infrastructure for our future development activities. Our VP/Development Fred Isaac is our liaison with them, and we expect good returns.

And speaking of returns: I am looking forward to our next conference in Charleston, SC. Shoshanah Seidman, Jim Rosenbloom and a dedicated group of members and volunteers are working hard on putting all the moving parts together, and the very good news is that their efforts helped to significantly reduce the registration fees. Please follow the links on our web site to register. I hope to see all of you there.

In the meantime Jim, our National Conference Chair is working on confirming our 2017 conference location, and we will let you know about it soon.

This is nomination and elections season. Heidi Estrin is chairing a committee charged with charting the shape our future leadership. The new Board of AJL will be installed at the General Meeting during the Charleston Conference after we vote them into office in the next couple of months.

Our Strategic Planning is an ongoing process, led by Jackie Ben Efraim, with some visible and some less visible (but existing nonetheless) results. We hope to share the next version of it (8.2) on our web site soon.

In the areas of visibility and relevance I'm glad to report that Elliot Gertel, our ALA Liaison, with the help of other AJL members who are also ALA members, and some non-affiliated allies, succeeded in stopping an attempt to put a motion on the ALA's Council agenda to boycott Israeli Libraries.

Also in an effort to "be in the room" with leaders, clergy and laity, who make decisions about sustaining libraries in synagogues and schools, we have dispatched a small delegation to the URJ Biennial that was held in Orlando, Florida this past year. We did the same at United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism 2015 convention in Schaumburg, IL. Our members engaged attendees in these conferences in conversations about the roles of libraries, and AJL members who maintain them in their institutes. I hope to do more of the same in the next year, and perhaps be effective in stemming the pattern of closing libraries in Jewish day Schools and Centers.

Which brings me to the issue of attrition in the numbers of AJL members – they have been significantly reduced, and repeated creative efforts by our VP/Membership, Sheryl Stahl, to reverse the trend have hit a wall. On one hand this is common in the life of every membership based organization: retirement, loss of interest, frustration with perceived stagnation, and financial considerations are part and parcel of such a tide. On the other hand, it is incumbent upon all of us who cherish our affiliation with AJL to help improve and grow our Association so we can continue to provide not only benefits to our

members, but also leadership in our unique field.

I am cautiously optimistic about our collective future as the last quarter of my tenure as AJL President is coming to an end. This position is a unique combination of being a locomotive engineer and an orchestra conductor; the first allows one to see the road ahead while working to feed the engine that drives us all, and the second allowing a bird's eye view of collaborations and efforts to play our shared music and themes. It's a nice ride, most of the time, and from where I stand, it looks like our work is paying off and allowing all of us to make a difference in the world as we mend some broken vessels.

I am writing this on Tu Bi-Shvat, a day that celebrates growth and green and a promise of new fruit, and this is the spirit with which I sign off this message. Please stay in touch and do not hesitate to get in touch with me about any or all AJL matters.

Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award

The Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award Committee has chosen *Honey and Me* by Meira Drazin as the winner of the 2016 Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award. The Award is given to an unpublished fiction manuscript for readers aged 8 to 13. The manuscript should appeal not just to Jewish readers and should present positive aspects of Jewish life.

Honey and Me is the story of a year in the friendship of Honey Wine and Milla Bloom, who narrates this story of the two Modern Orthodox sixth graders. The girls are very different in personality and family life but balance each other in their friendship.

The year is fraught with change, family crises, and personal growth including Honey's becoming a bat mitzvah in a women's minyan, the death of a beloved teacher, and Milla's complicated relationship with her mother.

While there were several outstanding entries in this year's competition, the judges were taken by the energy of the characters, the natural way Judaism was woven into the story and the contemporary flavor to the manuscript. Said one of the judges: "This is a modern American story set within an observant Jewish milieu." Another commented that "the variations in lifestyle between families of Orthodox Jews living in a modern and positive world are rarely depicted in such a non-judgmental way."

Ms. Drazin is a transplant from Toronto and New York to London, England, where she lives with her husband and four children. A graduate of Barnard College with an MA in English and Comparative Literature, she has been a senior editor for New York Family and is currently a freelance magazine writer.

Ms. Drazin was inspired by Sydney Taylor, the author of the beloved All-of-A-Kind Family series, which, she feels, shows the importance of the smaller dramas in everyday life. *Honey and Me* does indeed meld the everyday events in the lives of Honey and Milla with their Jewish identities.

The author especially appreciates the Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award during this current discussion in the children's literature world of diversity in children's books. In addition, she feels that "It's a huge honor and validation for any writer to be acknowledged for his or her work, not to mention tremendously exciting. But, as they say in the Talmud, 'kal va-chomer' – how much more so to be awarded the Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award, an honor literally named for the very inspiration for my project!"

Ms. Drazin has been invited to accept her award at the 51st Annual AJL Conference in Charleston, South Carolina in June 2016.



Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award - Call for Manuscripts

The Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award Committee is now open to receive manuscripts for the 2017 award. The Competition is open to unpublished writers of fiction for readers ages 8-13. Manuscripts should have broad appeal and show positive aspects of Jewish life. Short stories are not eligible. Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award Committee Opening

The Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award Committee has an opening for one member. Members of AJL interested in serving on the Committee should have some background in book reviewing or similar experience and a familiarity with the goals and constructs of children's literature.

The committee's duties consist of reading unpublished manuscripts, completing an evaluative rubric and writing evaluations of those manuscripts. The committee then deliberates via email to choose a successful candidate and winner of the Sydney Taylor Manuscript Award.

Committee members must be able to meet deadlines and must commit to thoughtful, detailed written evaluations. Manuscripts for consideration are accepted until September 30; a decision is reached by mid-January.

The committee is especially interested in candidates from the Midwest, New England or outside of the US. Committee members must also be members in good standing of AJL.

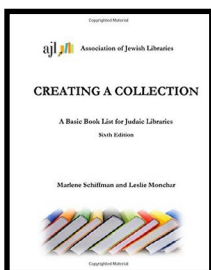
