

POSITION ON THE FACULTY, DEPARTMENT OF GEOLOGY, STANFORD UNIVERSITY

Specialization: Tertiary stratigraphy and invertebrate paleontology.

Rank, age, salary: The appointee will receive the rank of assistant professor. He must hold the Ph.D. Degree prior to the beginning of the period of appointment. Preferably, his age should be in the 20's or early 30's. The beginning salary will depend on experience.

Qualifications: The appointee must be an exceptionally promising young scientist, with skill and interest in teaching, with desire and ability for making scientific contributions, and willingness to play an active role in the University. He should be vigorous and stimulating in his contacts with students. The appointee's specialization in Tertiary stratigraphy and invertebrate paleontology must lend itself, by adaptation if necessary, to projects in the coastal ranges of California. His main interests may or may not be centered in laboratory work; in any case, he must be able and willing to encourage and supervise student research projects in the field. He may be called upon to teach courses in subjects apart from his specialization, insofar as his training is appropriate. Preference may be given to applicants who have demonstrated teaching and research ability, and who have published scientific papers of high quality, but every consideration will also be given to persons who are less experienced.

Starting time of duties: It is preferred that the appointee should be available in September, 1961, or at the beginning of January, 1962.

Applications: Applicants should write to the undersigned, and submit scholastic transcripts, a summary of education and experience, and names of persons who will supply letters of recommendation.
